High Holy Days 2022

"Celebrate endings, for they preceed new beginnings" – Jonathan Lockwood Huie

The High Holy Days in 2020 will be remembered as the strangest that any of us have ever experienced in our lives. Eve Decker, Zoe Francesca and I stood on the bimah in a completely empty room except for Mark Garetz who was directing and streaming our services to members of our community. Each family and every individual was sequestered away in their own homes. We, who were leading the services, decided that our kavanah – our spiritual intention – was that we were focusing on one family, represented by the two cameras on the wall at the back of the sanctuary. Mark was asked to shoot everything in very tight shots so that the people at home would be looking into our faces, counteracting the actual distance and the divide between us with a sense of intimacy that was never possible to experience in a crowded sanctuary. Given the enormous challenge that we were faced with – to maintain this connection for all of the High Holy Day Services we streamed – we did the best that we could and we felt good about the response to such a formidable challenge.

Last year in 2021, the challenge was different. We had a fairly good turnout in the sanctuary – most people were masked and distanced – and we knew that many people in our community chose to stay home and watch from the safety of their living rooms. Drew Porter joined Eve, Zoe, and me on the bimah, and Judith Markowitz helped lead the final service on Yom Kippur. We called it a hybrid service, and it, too, was quite challenging.

Finally, more than two and a half years after COVID irrevocably changed our lives, we are once again hopeful that our community will gather in person for these High Holy Days. We believe that it is vital for our community to come together in this way on these important sacred days. We still plan to hold our Shofar Service in Sycamore Park in the late afternoon on Rosh Hashanah day as we have done the past two years. We will also do our Tashlich Service in the park directly following our Shofar Service. We are planning to have a light lunch directly following the Morning Service on Rosh Hashanah on our patio to invite our members to be able to schmooze and connect in person.

Under the direction of Shelby Meyer Margolin, our Head of Religious School, we are planning some very engaging and fun High Holy Day experiences for the children of our community. We believe that these High Holy Days offer us some vital healing opportunities which will be greatly expedited through in person gatherings and connections. For those who are immune-compromised or unable to attend our services we will continue to offer stream our services. However, we are encouraging people to plan to attend in person whenever possible.

This year we once again have more members of our Chazzanut (Cantorial) Group in person to enhance the High Holy Day experience for the community. We are so looking forward to being together again in our lovely sanctuary and feeling the warmth and the incredible energy that being together makes possible. Blessings for a wonderful High Holy Day journey with our community.

- 10. When September 2023 rolls around and you review your answers to these questions, how do you think you'll feel? What do you think/hope might be different about your life and where you're at as a result of thinking about and answering these question/s?



Sukkot

Sukkot is a Jewish holiday that asks us to consider the importance of the spaces we inhabit. We leave our comfortable homes to sit in a flimsy, temporary structure – maybe have a meal there with some friends or come to the synagogue and enjoy an evening of community camaraderie. Perhaps we attend a brief service in which we shake the lulav and smell the aroma of the etrog.

We are challenged to both appreciate the cozy comfort of our homes which we often take for granted and empathize with those who have no such structures to which to return and call home. We are invited to think about the harvest in our lives at this moment, since Sukkot is the one of the annual Jewish harvest festivals. Of course, for us, not being farmers, harvest is a metaphor.

For so many of us, our relationship to many of our familiar spaces changed during the pandemic. COVID turned our homes into workplaces, schoolrooms, places we dared not leave for fear of getting sick. Some of us lost our privacy, some gained more than they bargained for.

New and not altogether comfortable phrases entered our consciousness: "Shelter In Place", "lockdown", "six feet apart" and "social distancing." We all learned how to navigate Zoom and soon developed "Zoom Fatigue." Our social persona became that little box on our screens. "Virtual" became a reality that we inhabited every day.

So how has this affected the way we think of our homes? What has been the impact on other places that we used to consider our sanctuaries? This year when we go out into the Sukkah, let's talk about these important questions. After COVID, have we become less likely to invite people into our homes? Are we less likely to be invited or even to accept invitations to go into other people's homes?

Has working out of our homes further eroded the uncertain line between work and home life? How has COVID affected the dynamics of our nuclear families? Our extended families? Some people made much more concerted efforts to stay connected with family with regular family Zoom calls and formed a stronger sense of connection than ever before. Is this going to continue? Are we going to simply let go of some of the positive things that emerged from the pandemic?

What impact has COVID had on our relationship to nature? Do we walk or hike more than we used to? Will that change now that the more intense fear of COVID has abated?

For most of our lives, Sukkot did not really challenge us to deeply consider our relationship to the spaces we inhabit. For some of us, COVID may invite us to celebrate Sukkot differently this year and have some important discussions about how our relationship to space and spaces we live in and move through are no longer taken for granted.

Bon Voyage to Heidi Stagg – we will miss you!

As many know by now, Heidi Stagg will soon be leaving Beth Chaim. She has been our wonderful office Administrative Assistant, and we will miss her very much. Heidi and her husband Aaron will be departing on a sailing trip in September, that has been their dream for many years!

Beth Chaim: Tell us about your upcoming adventure.

Heidi: In August my husband retired after 34 years as a union electrician. We have been living on our 42-foot sailboat in a marina in Alameda for 13 years now, but beginning in September we will be cruising all over! This has been a dream of both of ours since we were teenagers. We'll start by heading down the California coast for four weeks, stopping in Half Moon Bay, Monterey, Morro Bay, Catalina Island, Santa Barbara, Ventura, Long Beach and ending up in San Diego. Then we join 100



boats in the annual "Baja Haha", sailing from San Diego to Cabo San Lucas. Our ten-year-old grandson and 78-yearold father-in-law will join us for this ten-day sailing rally. After that we have no specific itinerary. We plan to continue up the Sea of Cortez, to La Paz, Guaymas, etc. There are hundreds of islands and coves we can sail to, until May 2023. Then we'll return to the US to wait out hurricane season before heading south again. Our sailboat sleeps four, has a water maker to convert salt water to fresh water, solar panels to generate all of our electricity, and Starlink, which will give us a connection to the internet, Facetime, etc.

Beth Chaim: Tell us about your job at Beth Chaim, and your various responsibilities.

Heidi: I first started working at Beth Chaim eight years ago and was there for about four years. I left to help a friend with a start-up charter boat company in Jack London Square – kayaking to work from Alameda! Then I worked for the Jewish Federation of the East Bay in a variety of roles. I was talking to Mary Jo Smith in 2020 about a grant offered by the CCJCC, which I was coordinating, and she mentioned there was a part time remote position open, which was perfect timing for me to return to Beth Chaim. I so enjoy working at Beth Chaim, it does not even feel like a job. I enjoy working closely with Rabbi Dan. I set his appointments and vet all of his calls. I check all Beth Chaim voicemail messages, email messages, and answer general inquiries about almost anything. I like prepping the bimah each week for Shabbat services – getting the candles ready, folding the tallit, etc. The bimah is a sacred place, and it makes me feel like I have a part of the Shabbat rituals. I also work on planning all the main events – B'nai Mitzvot, gala, High Holidays, etc. It makes me feel closer to Judaism working here. I truly love the people at Beth Chaim. You can tell that the members really care about one another and are there to support each other in times of need.

Beth Chaim: Which temple did you belong to in Alameda?

Heidi: We belonged to Temple Israel in Alameda, a reform temple. I was born and raised in Alameda and went to Alameda High School. I converted to Judaism 27 years ago, because my first husband was Jewish, and we raised our children Jewish. My daughter became a Bat Mitzvah at Temple Israel. We bought a house in San Leandro when I was the CEO of the Chamber of Commerce and then the Chabot College Foundation. I did fundraising, nonprofit management, and event coordination. We joined Temple Beth Shalom in San Leandro while living there, and my son had his Bar Mitzvah there. I was newsletter editor for both Temple Israel and Temple Beth Shalom at the same time.

My current husband Aaron is of Portuguese descent, and he is not Jewish. We both grew up in Alameda and have known each other since we were four years old. We were both separated when we reconnected 13 years ago and got married eight years ago. I learned a lot about Judaism at that time from a 13-week class from the organization Chai Mitzvah, taught by Rabbi Dan. It was about celebrating the Jewish holidays, Shabbat, social action, and more. My husband and I enjoy celebrating Shabbat every week. We light the candles using a pair of travel candlestick holders with votives – a gift to me from the Beth Chaim board when I left the first time. We also do the blessings and have wine and a nice meal each Friday night. We started this routine eight years ago after taking that class from Rabbi Dan.

Beth Chaim: Good luck to you on your sailing adventure!

Heidi: Our sailboat is named Sonyo, which is Portuguese for "dream". As we begin this new chapter we are "Vivo O Sonyo" ... "Living the Dream!" I will always hold a special place in my heart for Beth Chaim and am sure our paths will cross again. I'll be blogging during our adventure; follow us at <u>www.VivoOSonho.com</u>!

Beth Chaim: Tell us about your family:

Katie: There is just 3 of us in our family – me, my husband Kofi, and our daughter Millie. We also have our dog named Brad. Millie is now in kindergarten at Rancho Romero, and before that attended Tree of Life Learning Center for preschool.

We enjoy going to various parks as a family – Millie's favorites are Athan Downs in San Ramon and the new Rancho San Ramon Park – it has a zipline and a big splash pool. We also enjoy going to Tilden Park with the train and old-fashioned carousel. A highlight of last summer was going to Disneyland – it was Millie's first time there. As soon as we walked in we saw Minnie Mouse, so Millie was thrilled.

Beth Chaim: Where did you both grow up?

Katie: I grew up in San Jose, and Kofi grew up in Richmond, CA. I went to Santa Clara University for undergrad and recently completed my graduate degree online. Kofi went to UC Davis for undergrad, and did his graduate work at Cal. Both of his degrees are in Engineering.

Beth Chaim: How did you two meet?

Katie: We met online 13 years ago on eHarmony, and now we have been married for almost nine years! When we met, I was working as a teacher in the San Jose Unified School District. Kofi was working in Oakland and needed to be near Bart. Initially we were renting an apartment on the peninsula in San Bruno, then bought our first house in San Ramon. Two years ago we moved from San Ramon to Alamo.

Beth Chaim: Tell us about your careers:

Katie: I have been teaching for 13 years now – five years of teaching third and fifth grade in San Jose Unified, and the last eight years in SRVUSD. I taught eighth grade core at Gale Ranch Middle School in San Ramon for four years, then fourth grade at Alamo Elementary School for four years. This year I am working in SRVUSD as a Teacher on Special Assignment as an Equity Liaison, which is a brand-new position this year. I had met Kelley Cohen when we attended the children's service at the High Holidays at Beth Chaim when Millie was just over a year old. Before starting Tree of Life, we attended many Beth Chaim Torah Tots sessions, and the children's service at the High Holidays, and Millie really liked everything. With Torah Tots, we liked the curriculum, the way they focused on a Jewish holiday or other Jewish theme each month. When Millie was a toddler attending Torah Tots, as parents we just wanted her to have fun and interact with other kids, so it worked out really well. We also met Lara Groch through Tree of Life, Torah Tots, and PJ Library. Millie loves getting a free Jewish book sent to her in the mail each month.

We attended the Beth Chaim kindergarten orientation last spring on Zoom, and it was really helpful to get more details about Sunday school. We found out the schedule, more information, and felt like all of our questions were answered.

Beth Chaim: What are you looking forward to at Beth Chaim?

Katie: We are excited about Sunday School for Millie. She has loved celebrating Shabbat each week at Tree of Life. It is so much fun to see Millie get excited about religion at such a young age. Why Brotherhood and Sisterhood in the 21st Century?

Inspiration and a few parts lifted from Rabbi Amy R. Perlin, D.D. – Temple B'nai Shalom



I grew up in a congregation with a Sisterhood and Men's Club. Every Los Angeles congregation had one. Sisterhood controlled the temple kitchen and raised tens of thousands of dollars for the temple every year. The Men's Club ushered on High Holy days, ran the Purim Carnival and was the springboard for temple presidents, who were always men. They were traditional gender-separate organizations popular in the 1950's, 60's and 70's. They were powerful within the temple structure and a source of Jewish social connection for Jews.



Patricia and I came to BCC after Temple Beth Torah in Fremont canceled the satellite Hebrew program for our daughters. I was surprised that the Brotherhood was in charge of the kitchen and ran a temple catering service at Greenbrook Elementary and then again at the new Temple. During that period, Brotherhood was a vibrant group of both the young and not so young attending events and volunteering. Sisterhood was pretty much the same way.

After 2 ½ years as Brotherhood President I'll be stepping down when my term ends. I have been banging my head against the wall wondering how a vibrant group has become apathetic. Why did all age groups mingle 20 years ago and not today? So the question I will ponder during High Holidays is, "Why Brotherhood and Sisterhood in the 21st century?" We are in the midst of a paradigm shift in American Jewish life, and there is a need to reevaluate who we are, how we are organized, and what is meaningful for our membership at this time in Jewish history.

I think both groups are facing an interesting dichotomy: how to be Jewish organizations and safe havens for those who want the synagogue to be a place for making Jewish friends and sharing Jewish bonds, even as they know they need to embrace and be welcoming to the non-Jewish members of the congregation with the intermarriage rate being over 52% in the country.

The disappearing Jewish male/the cautious, seeking non-Jewish husband are two sides of a complex coin facing the modern Brotherhood, today. Men want a place to express what it means to them to be Jewish. There is also a great need to help non-Jewish spouses find a home and place for connection. We can laugh at how great it is to have men who can actually use tools to put up a sukkah... and we can explore how challenging it is to address Jewish issues in a way that doesn't alienate those who have the courage to make BCC their spiritual home, even if they are not Jewish.

The Brotherhood needs to meet both needs and I believe the Brotherhood can be that safe place to connect with other men, in a world where men are expected to spend a lot of their spare time with their families and fulfilling family responsibilities, much more so than men 40 or 50 years ago. Brotherhood is then a safe haven for Jewish men and a place of welcome for all temple men at the same time.

We cannot underestimate the need for meaning in an age where most communication is online rather than in person. Why Brotherhood? Because, I believe it has proven to be the best way to help men feel connected to the synagogue and might very well be the best way to help non-Jewish men feel connected to the Jewish men who are part of synagogue life. There is also a growing need for Jewish men to feel their presence and importance in temple life, and to be able to bond in traditional male ways.

From the Red Tent of Biblical times to the BCC Hiking group sitting together at Peets' coffee kibbitzing we are wired to bond with people like ourselves. To the extent that Brotherhood and Sisterhood are welcoming and accepting, they serve important roles by fostering connection within synagogue life. Brotherhood and Sisterhood are about belonging, not just to these groups, but to the temple as a whole.

The answer to the question Why? is not Why Not? The question, "Why Brotherhood and Sisterhood?" must be asked regularly to clarify the mission and purpose of each organization, as the congregation moves through what will be a life changing century for the American Jew.

For now, we know that the vital role each group plays is integral to the ongoing mission of our congregation. Our auxiliaries create opportunities and points of access to the newcomer, the seeker, the lonely, and the volunteer among us. They are opportunities to teach and live a meaningful Jewish life in a world where we are a smaller percent of the population each year. And when they function in a healthy way, as organizations of support, focusing on contentment rather than discontent, these groups engage our lives for the better.

Grades K-7

I am constantly in awe of the wisdom I find in our Jewish traditions. Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish new year, is not just a celebration of new beginnings, but also a time of deep reflection and growth. We start preparing for this holiday weeks before it starts by taking stock of our lives and the way we show up in the world. Yom Kippur, the day of atonement, demands that we change and become a better version of ourselves.

I feel blessed that I get to move through this process on both a personal and professional level. In preparing for the new Beit Midrash year, I spoke with almost every family to get their feedback about our program. It was wonderful to hear their enthusiasm for what we have done in the past year and to hear what they would like more of in the coming year. Almost every family spoke about their desire to deepen students' relationships with each

other and bolster their Hebrew skills. Families with younger siblings were also interested in more robust Tot programming. It is now my task to make changes to support families' desires!

Student relationships start in the classroom. Our Beit Midrash teachers have always made relationship building a priority. This year, we welcome three new dynamic educators to our teaching team: 7th Grade will be taught by Jeff Reitzes on Sundays and Jonathan Cohen for Hebrew, and 6th grade Sunday School will be taught by Rabbi Jamie Hyams! Jeff is a beloved member of our Beth Chaim community, serving as our Education Chair and Sunday School greeter for many years. He also taught the incoming 7th grade class when they were in 3rd grade, and couldn't resist the opportunity to be with them during the B'nai Mitzvah year! Jonathan is an active member of our Beth Chaim, Tree of Life, and Tot Programming communities. He honed his Hebrew skills while living in Israel for a number of years and is excited to share his passion for the language and his huge heart with our 7th graders. Jamie Hyams served as the spiritual leader at P'nai Tikvah in Las Vegas, and as the Associate Director at the Shalom Hartman Institute of North America. On occasion, Jamie has taught and led services here at Beth Chaim and is involved in the Sisterhood. We feel so blessed to welcome these teachers into our community!

Relationships take root in the classroom, but they grow through communal events. We hope that all families and community members will join us for our **2nd Annual Summer Sing Out: Shabbat Edition on Friday, September 16th at 5:30pm.** This will be a great opportunity for our entire Beth Chaim community to gather for food, song, and schmoozing. Students will see classmates and teachers, brotherhood and sisterhood can share their summer stories, Chavurahs can kick-off the new year together, and new members will see what our community is all about! Plus, we'll introduce our new song leader, Rana Rines, who knows of our older students from *I Can Do That!* Performing Arts Center. Rana also taught Music Together (an early childhood music curriculum for infants-preschoolers) and worked with 1st-6th graders on musical productions through the Berkeley Playhouse and Serious Fun After School Inc. Rana will provide a Ruach-filled environment for our students and community to bond through music and dance! The Summer Sing Out will be just a taste of what is to come, as Rana will lead Ruach Shabbat services once a month throughout the year. We will have community dinners before each service for the whole community!

To meet our students' Hebrew needs, all of our 3-7th graders were offered free Hebrew tutoring to get ready for next year. We are also moving to 1-on-1 Hebrew tutoring sessions so each student will get the individualized attention needed to be comfortable with Hebrew and prayers. Sunday School will include new Hebrew activities, and teachers will be checking in more regularly to assess students' progress. All of these strategies will ensure our students feel more comfortable with our sacred language.

Our Tot Programming, led by the effervescent Lara Groch, is a staple in the Jewish Bay Area Community. This year, we are kicking off our programming with fun-filled High Holy Day Services with Tkiya, an organization dedicated to participatory music experiences that connect kids with Judaism. There will be puppets, musical prayers, and instruments galore! Please join us on the Beth Chaim patio Rosh Hashanah afternoon at 4pm, and Yom Kippur afternoon at 3:30pm for Tot Services.
