
Rabbi Dan's Reflection

Eight Ideas for a Meaningful Hanukkah

Here are eight ways to make each night of Hanukkah more special and interactive with your friends and family. By: Rabbi Goldie Milgram

- 1. Family History Night. One night of Hanukkah invite family of reference and/or preference to come over for candle lighting. Family of reference are the people we are related to by birth or adoption; family of preference are the close people we add to our lives to enhance our sense of expanded family. Be sure to have a video camera or tape recorder. Ask each person to come prepared to share one story about someone in "the family" who is no longer alive or able to share their own story. Done each year, this will result in a rich treasure chest of family memories. The next year give copies of the previous year's video as Hanukkah gifts to those who attended, as well as family who couldn't make it.
- 2. One night have a personal or **family check in** with questions like: How are we spiritually alive and vital as a person/family? How are we suffering under the norms of the larger culture? How can we dedicate ourselves to spiritual vitality? Brainstorm a family list of exciting and helpful options for a more alive, soulful existence. Set a few dates for implementation of important ideas which arise and perhaps give individual assignments.
- **3. Study Readings on the Theme of Light.** Ask each person to bring one object, poem, idea or something that has brought the pleasure of light into their life. They might bring it to share and show, or to swap with someone else to experience light in a new form! For example, a kaleidoscope, a beautiful sun catcher, [or] a poem about light. My son brought up something improbable that turns out to exist: a solar flashlight! A story about Nelson Mandela was brought by one person and that of Rabin by another, Hannah Sennesh by another.
- **4. Israel Night.** Everyone brings a clipping, item or idea about the modern Maccabees and their state: Israel. The clippings would be about both amazing and challenging things that are going on in Israel or about Israel. Let each person present what they brought and figure out a way to bless it after a thorough discussion. For example, [an] article about a plan to destroy the mosque on the Temple Mount [encouraged] a blessing to pray for the persons who intended this to refocus on dialogue about how to share sacred space. Another article talked about seeds for new high protein foods developed by Israeli scientists, which could help feed people in struggling nations. Our blessing was for the nations to experience the light of our love through the energy in each seed.
- **5.** On one of the nights of Hanukkah open all of the tzedakah boxes in the house and count the money in preparation for giving to a worthy cause. A lovely practice I learned from my teacher, Reb Zalman Schachter-Shalomi, is to take all change out of my pockets before lighting shabbat candles and put it into a tzedakah box (collection box for charity). When everyone in a household does this, the tzedakah boxes get very full. Sometimes we would put in even more than pocket change to celebrate someone wonderful in our lives.
- **6.** On another night of Hanukkah decide which important causes to send the money to. Have every person bring a clipping about a cause they believe [deserves] funding. Each person also brings three blank checks with them. Have everyone present their cause and reasons. Have each person privately fill in each of their checks in the amount of their choice for the causes which most strike them as important to send light to on this Hanukkah night. Families who are doing the tzedakah box collection described earlier in this list can regroup on the last night of Hanukkah to allocate the funds to the causes presented tonight.
- **7. Bring light into someone's life.** Bring your menorah for lighting to a shelter for battered women, homeless persons or elders. Listen to the Torah of each person's life with care...invite them each to light a candle and express their greatest hopes for their future or most precious memory of light in their lives. With money from the tzedakah box project above obtain something needed by that community and bring it with you. If you have children in your life, make sure they come along with you and help with the blessings and decisions!
- **8.** A long-standing practice is to silently watch the candles burn; it is a form of Jewish meditation practice as far back as the Talmudic period. Loosely focus your eyes on the menorah and savor the minutes of pure light. Notice what comes up for you, even after the last flame has sizzle-fizzled out. What blessings have occurred for you during the eight nights of lights? Share your experiences.

Gifts That Endure

On giving Time rather than Presents

Each December, as I place the candles in our Hanukkah menorah, I try to remember the best gifts I have received over the years. There were clothes, but they have been outgrown. Toys have long since been broken or given away. The gelt (money) was spent long ago, for what I cannot recall.

The gifts that I am still unwrapping are the gifts of family and celebration. I recall how my brother and I would argue about who would be privileged to strike the match and light the candles in the silver menorah that sat on the window ledge in our kitchen. No doubt the argument would have lasted the same eight days as the legendary oil were it not for the insight of our parents, who pointed out that since there were eight nights, we could take turns. (Ah, the wisdom of our ancestors to have ensured an even number of evenings!)

Once the candles were lit and the prayers and melodies sung, we would play a game we called the contest of the candles. My brother and I each chose the candle we thought would burn the longest. While the candles flickered, we'd eat our dinner until we had our fill of crisp latkes (potato pancakes), tangy applesauce, and sweet conversation. We'd cheer on our chosen candle. In the middle of winter, when the days were short, when the dark descended early in the evening and lifted well after I had to rise in the morning, we never hurried the time we had together.

On Hanukkah, I heard the story of my people's determination to retain their identity in a society that demanded conformity. The Greco-Syrians wanted the Jews of the time to abandon their distinct culture and become like the Greeks in practice and belief. It was a misguided political effort to consolidate an empire by imposing uniformity. A group of Jews led by the Maccabean family revolted and triumphed. Through song and prayer, our family celebrated a heritage of courage and dedication. In those evenings before the menorah, I received the gift of faith by being raised in a particular community of faith.

Too often during this holiday season, we convey the wrong lessons. We train our children in consumerism, not citizenry. We teach them that material products satisfy and that happiness can be bought. We create increasing discontent by celebrating goods rather than goodness.

In the Bible, the very first use of the word "holy" is in connection with a day: "And God blessed the seventh day and sanctified it" (Genesis 2:3). Before a people were called holy, before a place was marked as sacred, time was sanctified.

What would it mean to give our children gifts of time, to teach them that who they are is more important than what they own? Shared moments that nurture relationships, confidence, and trust are a child's first religious experiences.

Beyond any material tokens of affection, let us give our children gifts of time, to teach them that who they are is more important than what they own. Shared moments that nurture relationships, confidence and trust are a child's first religious experiences.

Wrap up a gift of time--an evening for stories and family games, a day for learning a new skill in cooking, sports, or crafts.

Wrap up a gift of wonder--an afternoon looking through old pictures and memorabilia or walking outdoors to discover winters natural surprises.

Wrap up a gift of appreciation--hours for helping others, making food baskets, reading to the elderly.

Wrap up a gift of faith--fixed times for rituals, songs and holiday food. Faith grows not from explicit instruction but from the touch, sounds and taste with which we grow comfortable.

As I look back over Hanukkahs past, these are the gifts I remember. What will we give that our families will remember? At a time when television tells us that everyone wants to be a millionaire, let us unwrap with our children and loved ones gifts of time and wonder, gifts of appreciation and faith, gifts of the heart.

Believing in Miracles

The many stories related to Hanukkah actually recount two different miracles--one supernatural, the other "natural". The Rabbis speak of two different kinds of miracles that the menorah proclaims. We must decide whether to believe in and propagate either.

The Miracle of the Oil

The miracle recalled in the Talmud speaks of a cruse of oil that burned for eight days instead of one. That is a supernatural miracle violating the laws of nature. Taken literally, it promotes a belief in supernatural intervention. It may even denigrate human effort. Perhaps that kind of belief explains why Lubavitch Hasidim refused to wear gas masks during the Iraqi missile attacks on Israel in 1991 when chemical warheads were feared.

However, David Hartman argues that the miracle of oil is only a symbol that arouses human faith. When human beings are willing to believe that more is possible than meets the eye, then they will invest in historical projects like the Maccabean Revolt and the Declaration of the Independence of Israel in 1948 even against all odds. Our presupposition that a cruse of oil cannot burn for eight days, that it is a natural impossibility, is only a symbol of the mistaken belief in the historical impossibility of change.

The Miracles of the Few Against the Many

Even if we cannot embrace the miracle of the cruse of oil, the Rabbis offered a different kind of miracle to celebrate. The Rabbinic prayer for Hanukkah, Al Hanisim, ignores the miracle of the oil and speaks of a general phenomenon possible in every generation whereby God helps human beings to bring about miraculous rescues from historical oppressors. This belief in God's miracles does not undermine human effort but causes it to redouble. The miracle is "natural" within the realm of historical possibility, yet inconceivable and unattainable by oppressed peoples who don't believe in its possibility.

In the Exodus from Egypt, God initiates the miracles for a passive, despairing people of slaves. However, on Hanukkah, first the martyrs like Hannah and then the zealots and the warriors initiate the redemptive process. In a world where God seems eclipsed, where there are no supernatural signs and no prophets, where the leading priests accepted Hellenism as a boon, the Maccabees bear witness to another dimension. They evaluate the world differently and they believe in a Divine power whose hidden will becomes manifest. The Rabbis celebrated the political and military manifestation of God's miracle in the Maccabees' victory.

Personally, I prefer the miracle of the few against the many. I need to reject the miraculous long-burning cruse of oil lest I be understood as an anti-rationalist or passive Jew. But perhaps beyond my polemic against the childish legend, I need to mature and to reinterpret both kinds of miracles as opening me up to other dimensions, to possibilities in myself and in my world that I have too quickly foreclosed. Believing in miracles is another way of learning to keep my options open and letting myself be surprised.

When Do I Light That Candle?

Candles and candlelight are a sacred part of our Jewish ceremonies and celebrations. Sure, we're all pretty clear on Shabbat and Chanukah, although that right to left and lighting the newest candle gets us every now and again, but what about Yahrzeit candles?

Yahrzeit candles remind us of the fragility of life. It is a mitzvah to light a Yahrzeit candle, at sundown, on the anniversary of a loved one's death. Typically a candle will burn for 24-26 hours and should be left to extinguish itself.

While the candle is lit and burning, the family may gather to tell stories and share memories of the loved one who has passed. It is a wonderful way to keep the loved one's memories alive.

In addition to the anniversary of a loved one's death, Yahrzeit candles should also be lit on Yom Kippur and at sundown preceding the last night of Sukkot, Passover and Shavuot.

If you have provided us with the names of your loved ones who have passed, you will receive a reminder card with the name of your loved one as well as instructions for what Prayers should be said when lighting the candle. If you have not provided us with names, or have additions, please contact the office, we will add them to our list. Additionally, we would like to provide you with a complimentary Yahrzeit candle for your use during your Yahrzeits. Please stop by our office at your convenience.

As a mitzvah Beth Chaim, Judith Markowitz and Glen Schabacker have graciously underwritten both the cards as well as the candles. We thank them for their donation to our Community.




