Our community newsletter, the Beth Chaim Star, is published six times each year. Regular sections include:



Recently, at the Sisterhood retreat during Sukkot, Ellen Waltrip (our new BCC Board Director of Marketing and Communications) asked the question if there might be an opportunity for adult B'nei Mitzvah. A seemingly

innocuous question at the end of a session stirred several other women to express a similar desire for adult B'nei Mitzvah.

Rabbi Jamie Hyams was at the retreat and spoke to me about this interest. What a delight to hear the enthusiasm and desire for adult spiritual connection. Over the years we have done numerous Adult B'nei Mitzvah usually with cohorts of three or fewer people. When we let the community know that we were planning to offer a new adult B'nei Mitzvah program we received an incredible response. More than a dozen people expressed interest in participating in this program!

We scheduled two informational sessions to listen to what people had in mind and respond to questions about how we were going to proceed. At our first session in December, there was a great diversity of opinions expressed regarding what people wanted from their adult B'nei Mitzvah experience.



A number of people were concerned that they did not know any Hebrew and wondered if they could have a Bat Mitzvah without learning to read the language. They expressed that they had learned many of the prayers through attending services and had a meaningful connection to Jewish prayer; some loved to study Torah, and others simply wanted to affirm the importance of their Jewish identity and have an experience that wasn't available to them when they were younger. There were others who had learned to read Hebrew but hadn't practiced in a long time and wished to renew this ability as part of their adult B'nei Mitzvah. There were also a few who were fluent Hebrew readers, quite comfortable with prayer and really wanted to learn how to chant from the Torah as part of their Adult B'nei Mitzvah.

Rabbi Jamie and I were clear that we had no preconceived notions about "requirements" for an adult B'nei Mitzvah. We were clear that we wanted to create something within the Shabbat Morning Service – the traditional sacred container for Bar and Bat Mitzvah. We further asserted that within this service there was a wide range of possibilities for meaningful expressions of commitment to honoring and deepening one's Jewish identity. We are open to being as responsive as possible to each individual's needs during this process. Within one or more Shabbat Morning services we feel that we can accommodate the whole gamut of expressed desires for what should be a wonderful Adult B'nei Mitzvah journey.

For those who want to explore if an adult B'nei Mitzvah experience might be of interest to you, we have another informational session planned for Wednesday, January 18th at 7 pm in the Beth Chaim library. We look forward to seeing you then to continue to listen to expectations, aspirations, and any questions you might have.

A Note from our Past President

Happy New Year! As we venture into this new year, I wish all of you a healthy and happy 2023!

I am using this opportunity to reiterate information that you received by mail last month and also was shared at our December Annual Meeting. Many members have asked about the strategic plan and the results of the focus groups, so I want to be sure that all members have access to this information.

Two years ago, when I first began my presidency for BCC, we embarked on an ambitious strategic planning process to ensure a successful future for Beth Chaim. We took a big-picture approach, looking to the future five years to learn what our top objectives and priorities should be moving forward.

As you recall we did multiple focus groups and surveys and were very enthused with and grateful for your willingness to participate and give input. We received feedback from over 100 members! The goal of this effort was not to "fix" any individual issue, but instead to look for overall patterns of feedback from our members and discern the top five priorities of our entire congregation. These top five came from YOU, our members, not from the Board of Directors.

After accumulating all the feedback and results, it became obvious where the congregation felt we needed to focus:

- 1. Financial Stability
- 2. Improved programming, and communication about programming
- 3. A stronger focus on attracting and engaging younger families.
- 4. A Rabbinical Succession Plan
- 5. An updated Mission Statement that reflects who we are today, and where we are headed into the future.

The 2022 Board was excited to have made significant progress supporting these five initiatives. Here is a recap of the information that was shared at the December Annual meeting.

1. Financial Stability

With our \$4.4 million in debt coming due early in 2024, Dave Messing, Lee Rosenblatt and I have led an exploration of a land sale and partnership with Habitat for Humanity to create affordable housing. We hope to raise up to \$2 million from this sale. We will also need to find other financial strategies to fill the gap on retiring the debt.

2. Improved programming, and communication about programming



Roberta Gabriel and Deborah Wechsler introduced an expanded set of programming based on membership input, and we invite other members to step-up to drive further programming that aligns with your interests. Upcoming events are found in the weekly Happenings emails, on our website calendar, and summarized in The Star newsletter.

Larry Candeub as head of religious affairs has created a wonderful set of new programming around our Jewish identity and bringing us closer together as a community, including our very successful *Sharing Shabbat Together*.

3. A stronger focus on attracting and engaging younger families.

We have wonderful momentum through efforts by Beit Midrash Principal Shelby Margolin and preschool owner Kelley Bleier to strengthen the ties between Tree of Life Preschool and our Beit Midrash. These efforts, along with our PJ Library connection led by Lara Groch, are critical for us to drive membership growth with young families to our Beth Chaim Community.

4. A Rabbinical Succession Plan

A Rabbinic Transition team headed by Evan Levy and Marc Feder will be leading an effort to be discussed at the first board meeting of the 2023 to help find the next religious leader to fill the shoes of our beloved Rabbi Dan.

5. An updated Mission Statement for BCC which reflects who we are today, and where we are headed into the future. We have a renewed mission and vision statement led by the efforts of Rae Corr and Jim Mizes, with assistance from Michael Kolis, Aurelia Lubinsky, and Ogie Strogatz. They leveraged the work from the focus groups and surveys as well as further validation from small discussion groups to deliver a common identity and vision on which we can align into the future. I am excited to pass the baton and work with our new incoming President, and plan to remain on the Board as Past President to help where needed and to see the partnership with Habitat for Humanity through to completion.

Will You Join Us in Combatting Antisemitism?

It is an unfortunate testament to our times that, when our 12th-grade son was recently selecting colleges to apply to, among the important considerations was whether he would have to cover his Jewishness to be comfortable and not marginalized on campus. Also, would school leaders appropriately address the overt antisemitism that has emerged at some colleges and universities? Evidently, not always. If your family is similarly situated, you may have the same concerns, in addition to frustration that our kids' local schools are at best indifferent to the Jewish High Holy Days and other issues affecting Jewish students.

Those problems pale in comparison to the many violent and sometimes deadly attacks on Jews in the United States and elsewhere in recent times. And we are all familiar with the alarming proliferation of antisemitism in the United States and abroad, from left- and right-wing politicians; from celebrities and other influencers spreading monstrous ideas of Jewish conspiracy, Holocaust denial and the like; and from legions of hate mongers and benighted nudniks on social media. This simmering stew of Jew hate is becoming more rancid, and more and more people are feeling comfortable and empowered in joining in. So, what do we do about it? As Rabbi Dan rightly asserted at the BCC annual meeting, one approach that won't work is sitting quietly with our hands folded, ignoring the problem and hoping it will go away. History tells us that Jews tend not to fare well when they rely on hope



and inaction in the face of hatred and violence. As Menachem Begin famously proclaimed, "I am not a Jew with trembling knees." And we shouldn't be either.

What we need is a commitment from each of you to participate in support of the Beth Chaim community and the broader Jewish community and to act in the interest of our children and our children's future. You will hear more in coming weeks about opportunities to participate in Beth Chaim's efforts to combat antisemitism. I don't pretend to have all the ideas or answers. No doubt you all have ideas about how to address these matters. Together, we can accomplish a lot more than each of us can do alone.

Tu B'Shevat - Honoring the Tree of Life for the Sake of Life

What is the "Tree of Life" that the seventeenth century Kabbalists spoke of during their mystical celebration of *Tu B'Shevat*, our New Year of the Trees? Their original *Tu B'Shevat* seder, *Pri Ayts Hadar*, contained these words: "And may all the sparks that were scattered by Your hands, or by the hands of our ancestors . . . be returned to sustain in might and majesty the Tree of Life." What is the "Tree of Life" when we sing, "It is a Tree of Life to those who hold fast to it," as we return the Torah to the ark?

The Kabbalists' "Tree of Life" was a mystical construct representing various attributes of the Divine (the 10 *Sephirot*). The "*Eitz Chaim Hee*" that we sing refers to the Torah. What is it about trees that lend themselves to such exalting metaphors in our tradition? Is it the sustenance fruit trees provide? Is it the habitat that they offer to numerous species in the forest? Is it the oxygen that they provide to the air we breathe?

If we are to appreciate the tree as metaphor, then we must also appreciate the real trees of our world. Our Sages understood that trees were essential to human life. "If not for the trees, human life could not exist." (Midrash Sifre to Deut.20:19) Yet our trees are dying, and not just in redwood country. Entire species of trees are dying throughout our country - on the ridges of the Appalachian chain, in the sugar bush of Vermont, in the mixed forests of the mid-South border states, in the thick forests of central Michigan, on the mountainsides of Colorado and California. Charles Little, author of The Dying of the Trees, tells how this phenomenon has come about from 150 years of industrial expansion and pollution. Not only trees are dying. The World Resources Institute estimates that one half of all the world's species will be driven to extinction by the end of this century. Another ominous threat from this massive deforestation is global warming. Some scientists have even measured a depletion of life-giving oxygen in the atmosphere.

When we desecrate *adamah* -- the earth, we endanger *adam* -- the human. Paul Hawkin, in his book The Ecology of Commerce tells of the despair of one epidemiologist who, after convening a conference to examine the effects of chlorinated compounds on embryonic development, went into a quiet mourning for six months. The implications of that conference were astonishing. The immune system of every unborn child in the world may soon be irrevocably affected by the persistent toxins in our food, air and water.

How do we explain to our children that we knew they would be born with compromised immune systems, but we did nothing? From this perspective, the ceremonial planting of a tree or the celebration of a seder on *Tu B'Shevat* is about as effective as building Noah's ark with toothpicks. So what do we do? The blessing of faith is knowing that miracles can happen, but they need our coaxing.

Nothing in our tradition is more sacred than the preservation of life. What then is the meaning of *Tu B'Shevat*? Like Passover, its message is not confined to the seder, but rather is repeated throughout our liturgy and calendar. This way we keep in our hearts the memory of what God did for us when planting the seeds of life everywhere upon the earth.

May our prayers, meditations, and rituals throughout the year include the trees and the earth which sustain us, and may they go hand in hand with our many daily actions and choices, as we choose how we travel - by car or by foot, bicycle, or mass transit, as we choose how to heat our homes -- with conventional power or green power, as we choose what we eat -- more meat or more vegetables, grown with pesticides or organic, as we choose how to communicate -- with or without paper, made of trees or sustainable fibers, and as we choose how we conduct our business, for bottom line profit or as an important service to humankind.

This is the meaning of *Tu B'Shevat*. This is the way we honor the Tree of Life.

Tu Bishvat 2023

Excerpted from My Jewish Learning

Tu Bishvat or the "birthday" of all fruit trees, is a festival that has grown in importance in a climate of environmental crisis. The name is Hebrew for the 15th of the Hebrew month of Shevat.

In ancient times, Tu Bishvat was merely a date on the calendar that helped Jewish farmers establish exactly when they should bring their fourth-year produce of fruit from recently planted trees to the Temple as first-fruit offerings

The Tu Bishvat Seder

In the 16th century, the Kabbalists (mystics) of Tzfat (the city of Safed) in the Land of Israel created a new ritual to celebrate Tu Bishvat called the Feast of Fruits. Modeled on the Passover seder, participants would read selections from the Hebrew Bible and Rabbinic literature and would eat fruits and nuts traditionally associated with the land of Israel. The Kabbalists also gave a prominent place to almonds in the Tu Bishvat seder, since the almond trees were believed to be the first of all trees in Israel to blossom. Carob, also known as bokser or St. John's bread, became another popular fruit to eat on Tu Bishvat, since it could survive the long trip from Israel to Jewish communities in Europe. Participants in the kabbalistic seder would also drink four cups of wine: white wine (to symbolize winter), white with some red (a harbinger of the coming of spring); red with some white (early spring) and finally all red (spring and summer). Complete with biblical and rabbinic readings, these kabbalists produced a Tu Bishvat Haggadah in 1753 called "Pri Etz Hadar" or "Fruit of the Goodly Tree."

Zionism and Tree Planting

The early Zionists seized upon Tu Bishvat as an opportunity to celebrate their tree-planting efforts to restore the ecology of ancient Israel and as a symbol of renewed growth and flowering of the Jewish people returning to their ancestral homeland.

In modern times, Tu Bishvat continues to be an opportunity for planting trees — in Israel and elsewhere, wherever Jews live. Many American and European Jews observe Tu Bishvat by contributing money to the Jewish National Fund, an organization devoted to reforesting Israel (the purchase of trees in JNF forests is also customary to commemorate a celebration such as a Bar or Bat Mitzvah).

Environmentalism and Tu Bishvat

For environmentalists, Tu Bishvat is an ancient and authentic Jewish connection to contemporary ecological issues. The holiday is viewed as an appropriate occasion to educate Jews about their tradition's advocacy of responsible stewardship of God's creation, manifested in ecological activism. Tu Bishvat is an opportunity to raise awareness about and to care for the environment through the teaching of Jewish sources celebrating nature. It is also a day to focus on the environmental sensitivity of the Jewish tradition by planting trees wherever Jews may live.

The Tu Bishvat seder has increased in popularity in recent years. Celebrated as a congregational event, the modern Tu Bishvat seder is multi-purpose. While retaining some kabbalistic elements – and still very much a ritual that connects participant to the land of Israel – the seder today is often imbued with an ecological message as well.

Our Tot Shabbat, Torah Tots and Bagels and Blocks programs continue to welcome babies and young families into our community with song, dance and play. Every student had a part in the service, and everyone there got to sing and pray in community. Our fantastic Education Committee was ever present in helping set-up and clean-up, Larry Candeub brought his warm spirit and frozen ice cream, our Madrichim (teen leaders) helped serve our families, and Debbie Roof and Leslie Diamond spent hours baking their delicious and beautiful individual challahs for our first service. What an incredible community we have!

Grades K-7

Our activities in the classroom continue to bring light to our community. *Mishpacha* groups (family groups) bonded through our madrichim-led Color Wars: a beloved Jewish Summer Camp tradition. Our song leader Rana went into classrooms to teach students new songs that we will sing at future Ruach Services. Classes "buddied up" to play dreidel, learn Hebrew, and participate in "You Be The Judge" - an activity that invites students to wrestle with their own values and morals through real-world situations. Our 5th graders continue to film the Jewish History Movie—it is going to be feature-film length soon!

Our most exciting event was our Chanukah Celebration on Sunday, December 18th. We hired a professional DJ to play party games, and Kelley Cohen put together incredible Chanukah-themed art projects for students. Grace Munoz, our beloved 5th grade teacher and Education Committee member, filled our sanctuary with beautiful twinkly lights and inflated our Chanukah Bear and Dreidel. Our Education Committee and many parents showed up to make latkes and hotdogs, and teens in our community served donut holes, chips and fruit. We welcomed a number of not-yet members into our celebration, and I have high hopes that they will become members after our celebration!

I have mentioned my gratitude for our Education Committee several times, however it cannot be overstated. Our events would not be possible without the dedicated work of our School Administrator Alex Lofrese and our Education Committee, Jeff Reitzes, Grace Munoz, Kelley Cohen, Kristen Heiden, Anne Feder, Cameron Binder, Cindy Watkin and Keith Brors. Keith will be leaving our committee to join the Beth Chaim Board – they are lucky to have him!


