

Connecting to Israel: A Full Circle Moment

With the rise in antisemitism over the past few years, I have found myself gravitating back towards all things Israel. While my core beliefs have always been to fight inequity and any form of racism, standing up for my own people has never been foremost in my

thoughts - until recently. Having been raised with no real Jewish upbringing - no Jewish community, no religion, just a smattering of holidays and temple trips back East with the grandparents - I still always felt strongly tied to being Jewish. I just had no idea what that meant. So, it's been a lifelong journey of figuring that out.

My first real step was to embark on my college junior year abroad in Israel. My plan was to further my understanding of my Jewish connection, while trying to wrap my head around the never-ending Middle East peace crisis (no big goals here). Upon entering Israel at 20, I felt an indescribable connection towards this homeland. This completely foreign place, with young Israeli soldiers holding machine guns on every corner, abounding conversations in which everyone seems like they're yelling at one another, and Middle Eastern markets with animals hanging from racks, actually felt like home. I jumped into my effort to solve the peace crisis with intimate talks with Arabs in dorm rooms over Turkish coffee (against the will of my Jewish Israeli dorm roommate who shared her hate for the Arabs after her brother was killed). My goals were on track.

As my Jewish connections were being unveiled all around me, I hit a wall. Following a two-week trip through Turkey and Greece with some girlfriends, I began to experience an increased inability to think, feel, or breathe. Immediately upon returning to Israel, my house mother saw me looking white as a ghost and rushed me to a hospital. I learned my potassium levels were about to give me a heart attack as a result of having absolutely no kidney function. After a two week stay in an Israeli teaching hospital, with a young team of idealistic Soviet immigrants who tried to cure all that was wrong with me, I was sent back home to the states. Disappointingly, my Jewish journey of discovery came to a halt - in order for me to focus on a few more critical issues - like saving my life.

Fast forward some 33 years, inundated with negative Jewish images and messages from the political right and

left, I find myself hesitantly, but with full assurance, willing to proudly stand up for my own people. While radically against much of the actions of the recent Israeli government, the right of Israel to exist has never spoken louder to me. And my desire to connect to this homeland has returned with an even more powerful magnetism - feeling like a full circle moment.

After chatting with a few Beth Chaim friends, I learned about "Momentum" - kind of like a birthright trip for moms. I immediately applied and found out there were no local trips happening (a requirement for acceptance). The most recent partner of many of the local Momentum trips was an organization a lot of you probably know well called Hadassah. Many of your parents and grandparents may have been members of this over 100-year-old Women's Zionist Organization of America. With my lack of Jewish upbringing, I was hearing about Hadassah for the first time and a friend put me in contact with a California contact for Hadassah to seek more information about travel to Israel. I learned that Hadassah with its mission of "bringing more healing and justice to our world" had formed a new organization called "Evolve Hadassah: the Next Generation" with the goal of empowering young women to continue the mission of Hadassah. Evolve was sponsoring two brand new trips to Israel: Evolve Leadership Fellows (for women 45 and younger) and the Evolve Israel Experience (for women 55 and younger). Hearing this news, I immediately applied to Evolve Israel Experience (EIE). I knew the time was now as I'm approaching 54 this year. After a written application, letter of recommendation and zoom interview, I impatiently waited a very long two weeks to find out I was one of the 17 women in this country accepted to be part of the first cohort.

My excitement is immeasurable. A few decades older at 53, still idealistically wanting to do what I can to bring some peace to our crazy world, I cannot wait to share my next steps of this journey as I return to our Jewish homeland and find out how Hadassah and I can accomplish this feat together.

Why Tisha B'Av is Not Really About Mourning

We tend to think of Tisha B'Av, the fast day that commemorates the destruction of both ancient temples, as a time of mourning. But the traditional observances of Tisha B'Av — fasting, being unable to sit anywhere except on the ground, not washing, abstaining from sexual activity, not greeting other people, not wearing fresh clothes for the whole week before — are closer to the experience of being a refugee than to being a mourner.

When the Temple was destroyed, the people were thrown into exile. Jerusalem became a war zone and its people became refugees, forced to risk their lives to escape violence, famine, and devastation. The suffering was tremendous — "like deer, not finding a place to graze, walking without strength before a pursuer," in the words of the Book of Lamentations [Eicha in Hebrew].

[The] idea that exile and homelessness were punishment for our sins seems alien to many modern Jews. But the ancients were not as far from us as we think. In *Eicha* itself, most of the chapters describe the punishment God inflicted as excessive and abusive. Only in chapter 3 is Zion's destruction consistently described as fair and just.

There is another way to understand the destruction of Jerusalem and the dispersion of its people. According to the prophet Jeremiah, the traditional author of *Eicha*, the reason for the Babylonian exile was that the people did not let the land rest every seven years, as is biblically mandated Chronicles II 36:21. Since 490 years had passed without a sabbatical year, Israel had to go into exile for 70 years — one year for each sabbatical that was missed.

The Torah teaches that God will take the side of the land against the people if forced to, and that the land will "enjoy her Sabbaths" Leviticus 26:34 — even if that means the people are exiled or wiped out. What has intrinsic value is not humanity, but humanity's potential to do justice.

The Torah outlines six curses for not observing the sabbatical year, which describe how the relationship between the people and the land unravels.

But the idea that the destruction of Jerusalem came about because of how the Jewish people treated the land is not found in *Eicha*, where identification of the land with the people is total. Instead, Jerusalem's downfall results only from the moral downfall in relationships between human beings.

In Jeremiah too, the fate of Jerusalem is sealed only after the rich, who briefly set their slaves free, re-enslave them when it looks like the danger has passed Jeremiah 34. The overall message of these texts is that how we treat the stranger (the refugee, the foreigner, the convert) and the poor determines whether we have the right to remain in the land.

Even though most people are uncomfortable with the idea of divine retribution, in an age when our ecological "sins" are coming home to roost, the connection between disaster and divine retribution is not so farfetched. And since Creation is also compared to the sacred Temple in the Midrash, it is natural to connect the story of the Temple's destruction with the destruction of the earth and the sixth mass extinction initiated by human action.

But there is a very big difference: When the Jerusalem Temple was destroyed, there were other lands for the refugees to flee to. If we destroy the Temple that is the Earth, there will be no place untouched by tragedy.

As climate change puts more pressure on our ecosystems and our social systems, more and more people will become refugees like our ancestors, forced to flee areas no longer capable of sustaining human habitation. And for those fortunate enough not to live in such places, we will need all the spiritual resources we can muster to stay open to the humanity of the refugee and the stranger, while also taking care of our own communities.

All of these issues can become intertwined with the experience of *Eicha* and the story of Jerusalem's destruction. Reading *Eicha* is an invitation to remember what it means to be a refugee, and to think about how we can move towards justice for all people, for all species, and for the land herself.

Here is some interesting information about new members Lindsay, David and Logan Van der Bokke:

Beth Chaim: Tell us about your family:

Lindsay: My husband David went to Monte Vista High School and lived in Alamo. He attended UC Santa Cruz where he studied Engineering and is now an engineer at Google. I grew up in the Auburn area; my parents still live in Grass Valley. I came to the Bay Area to go to nursing school at USF. I have been a nurse for 15 years now.






