






Rabbi Dan's Reflection - Gratitude

So many people have asked me about strategies for navigating this particularly difficult time with the tragic war that continues to unfold in Israel and Gaza and the abhorrent spike in antisemitism globally. It may sound somewhat absurd and maybe even hard to comprehend, but for me, it is about staying

connected to gratitude.

This is an especially important time to embrace one's blessings. So today, I want to share what I am grateful for at this moment. As I make my way through the final year of service to the Beth Chaim community, I am feeling so much gratitude. This past Shabbat, we had a lovely Shabbat Evening Service in solidarity with Israel. I then flew into Palm Springs to conduct a wedding for Lexi Johnson, daughter of Nancy and Rick Johnson, who many of you know.

Twenty-nine years ago, Lexi was the first Brit Bat, the welcoming of a daughter into the Covenant, I was privileged to facilitate at Beth Chaim. I supported both Lexi and her older sister Erika through their Bat Mitzvah journeys. Nine years ago, I conducted Erika's wedding to her beloved Michael, and in 2018, I conducted the baby naming ceremony for their son, Russell, who was the ring bearer at Lexi and her husband Dan's wedding this past weekend. What an incredible honor to be so connected to so many families and be a part of so many moments of wonder.

This coming Sunday is our Beth Chaim Gala and I am so deeply appreciative to be honored at this event. People have asked me if I am sad to be leaving Beth Chaim in June. I am certain that I will feel sadness in leaving a spiritual leadership role that I have enjoyed for more than three decades. We all have blessings that sustain us. Our spouses, our parents, our children, our dear friends. At the end of the day, it is the love in our lives that comes through these connections that gives us the energy to make it through times like what we are going through right now. So, I think in this moment, we need to do a careful inventory of the most important blessings in our lives and allow ourselves to be fully nourished by these blessings.

Eight Chanukah Traditions from Around the World

From bonfires to hanging menorahs to an extra candle, here are some lesser-known Jewish Chanukah traditions from all over the globe

Many of the most well-known Chanukah traditions are universal. Whether you're in Argentina or Zimbabwe, Jews will mark the eight-day festival by lighting a menorah, eating fried foods and recounting the victorious story of the Maccabees and the restoration of the Temple in Jerusalem.

But Jews around the world have also developed Chanukah customs that are unique to their local community. For example, while jelly-filled donuts (sufganiyot) are a mainstay among Ashkenazi Jews, Chanukah in southern India is celebrated by making gulab jamnun, a milk-based ball of dough that is deep fried and then drenched in sugar syrup. The sweet treat is also consumed by non-Jewish Indians during other celebrations like Diwali.

Indian Jews enjoying gulab jamnun is far from the only example of a distinct tradition that a community has developed in Diaspora. Here are eight more customs that go beyond playing dreidel or giving Chanukah gelt.

1. Hanging the Menorah on the Wall

Most Ashkenazi Jews place a menorah in the window in order to publicize the miracle of Chanukah. In Morocco, Algeria and other North African communities, it is customary to hang the menorah on a hook in the doorway, beside the mezuzah. Putting the menorah near the mezuzah was thought to enhance the protection already offered by the mezuzah. If you look at menorahs made in North Africa, you will notice that many have a ring at the top, as well as a flat metal backing, so that the menorah could be safely hung.

Some Jews affiliated with Chabad also hang their menorahs. This group traces the tradition back to the Talmud (Shabbat 22a) which describes the menorah as being positioned on the doorpost like a mezuzah:

Rav Shmuel from Difti said: ... the *halakhah* is to place [the menorah] on the left so that the Chanukah lamp will be on the left and the mezuzah on the right. Then, one who enters the house will be surrounded by mitzvot.

2. Constructing a Menorah from Potatoes

Jews in Romania, as well as Austria and other central European communities, would scrape out potatoes, filling each potato space with oil and a wick to serve as the menorah. Rather than putting all eight out at once, each day they would add another potato. While the origin of this custom is unclear, it likely came about due to economic struggles.

3. Lighting an Extra Shamash

The Jewish community of Aleppo, which comprised mostly Sephardic Jews who had escaped the Inquisition, lit an extra *shamash* (helper candle) on each night of Chanukah. Several explanations exist — some say that the second shamash was meant to honor God and acknowledge the divine intervention that brought them to safety. Others say the custom was a nod toward the non-Jews of Aleppo, who welcomed them as refugees.

4. Glass Boxes on Display

Before mass immigration and the establishment of the State of Israel in the 20th century, Jews lived in Jerusalem for centuries and followed the ruling that the menorah's lights needed to be placed outside the home for all to see. This decree originates in the Talmud (Shabbat 21b):

The sages taught in a *beraita*: It is a mitzvah to place the Chanukah lamp at the entrance to one's house on the outside, so that all can see it.

However, Jerusalem winters are often wet and windy, so the community began crafting aquarium-like glass boxes to protect their flames. Inside, Jerusalem Jews put small cups of olive oil and lit a wick to correspond with each night. Some of Jerusalem's oldest homes even have a shelf carved out of the home's exterior walls to place the glass boxes in.

Today, many Israeli Jews have adopted this practice, although some will simply place a *Chanukkiah* with candles inside the box, rather than using oil.

5. Chag HaBanot: A Celebration of Women

Jewish communities in Libya, Tunisia, Algeria, Iraq, Iran, Turkey, Morocco, Greece and Yemen celebrate *another* holiday during Chanukah, known in Judeo-Arabic as *Eid Al Bnat* or *Chag HaBanot* in Hebrew, both of which translate to the Festival of the Daughters.

Observed on Rosh Chodesh Tevet (which falls on the sixth night of Chanukah), the girls and women of the community refrain from work and gather to recall Jewish heroines, particularly Judith, the Jewish woman who lived during the time of the Maccabees and helped prevent the impending siege of Jerusalem by decapitating the invading Assyrian general.

Chag HaBanot festivities vary from community to community, but often include eating sweets and fried treats, dancing, visiting the synagogue to kiss the Torah scrolls and singing well into the night. Girls approaching bat mitzvah age, as well as women who were engaged, were also publicly celebrated during Chag HaBanot.

6. Neighborhood Wine Tastings

The region of Avignon, located in southern France, is renowned for its wineries. During the Saturday night that falls during Chanukah, after Shabbat ended, the Jews of Avignon open a new bottle of local wine in their homes and make a toast. Then, each family travels around their neighborhood to taste the wines chosen by their neighbors and to toast to the miracle of Chanukah.

7. No Melachot Near the Menorah

It is a longstanding practice among North African and Middle Eastern Jewish communities, as well as Haredi Ashkenazi Jews, that as long as the menorah is lit, women refrain from doing *melachot*, the types of work that are forbidden on Shabbat and holidays. While Chanukah is not a holiday that requires Jews to refrain from labor, this custom can be traced back to laws codified by both Ashkenazi and Sephardic leaders who ruled, preelectricity, that the light of the menorah was not to be used for anything besides enjoying the holiday.

8. The Ninth Night of Chanukah

In some parts of Morocco, Jewish children spend the last day of Chanukah going from house to house to collect the leftover cotton wicks that Moroccan Jews used in place of candles. At sundown, the wicks are ignited to create a large bonfire, and each community gathers to sing, dance and even leap over the fire, which was believed to bring good luck to the jumper, especially to women seeking a partner or struggling to conceive.

Lifting Up Our Voices

An Adult B'not Mitzvah Shabbat Service



On December 2nd 2023, in the Beth Chaim sanctuary, eight members of Beth Chaim will become B'not Mitzvah in a joint Shabbat morning service. They are Kathie Bleier, Roberta Gabriel, Zoë Goldblatt, Nadine Rosenzweig, Kim Thompson, Susan Volsky, Ellen Waltrip and Deborah Wechsler. These women will lead the entire morning service after months of study and preparation with the prayers and the Torah portion "Vayishlach" found in the book of Genesis, Chapter 32:4-36:43. Rabbi Dan Goldblatt and Rabbi Jamie Hyams met with the group as a whole and individually over a period of months to share what goes into crafting a Shabbat morning service and how to write a D'var Torah. The women also formed their own study group, hosted by Kathie Bleier, to craft a unique and personalized service honoring struggle, transformation and women's voices.

Each of the eight women becoming a Bat Mitzvah has her own story and reasons for choosing this rite of passage at this time in her life. Some were denied a Bat Mitzvah experience because it was only offered to the males in their families. Some were not afforded the option because their families did not observe Judaism or were unaffiliated with any Jewish community. When the opportunity arose in 2023, they felt that this moment in time, with this community and these women, and these rabbis as teachers, called to them clearly and powerfully. Each woman has taken the opportunity to claim a part of the service and the Torah portion that is the most meaningful to her, to lead those parts and to speak about them to the congregation. They have chosen their favorite music and songs to go with the service and invited Beth Chaim's newest song leader, Rana Rines, to accompany them. They also invited Rabbi Dan and Rabbi Jamie to lead special blessings. After the service, there will be a reception in the sanctuary catered by Sunrise catering. Everyone is welcome!

Part of the B'not Mitzvah experience will involve a group mikveh experience in the week leading up to erev Shabbat, and participation by the women in the erev Shabbat (Friday night) service. A mikveh is an ancient Jewish ritual water immersion complete with kavanot (intentions), brachot (blessings) and simcha (joyful celebration and dancing). The mikveh will be a private event to help the B'not Mitzvah enter into sacred time as they prepare themselves to be in holy service to the Jewish community on Shabbat.

Please come on December 2nd to sing, to pray and to bless the women who will be showing their love of Judaism and community through Torah. Witness the deep and lasting bonds they have formed, and be inspired to become a lay leader, yourself, or to explore the richness and meaning in the Shabbat morning service as an adult bar or bat mitzvah in the next cohort.



Beth Chaim has two cubic yard containers for our trash but over the past year, we have been consistently generating more than this amount. Our trash pick-up costs have doubled compared to the pre-covid days due to trash overage costs. We were honored to welcome three shinshinim (young Israeli volunteers) to teach at Midrasha this month and to share about their family's experiences right now. Teens have written letters of support to our past shinshinim and to IDF soldiers. CCM educators continue balancing being a space for teens to relax and be together, while also making time to reflect on current events in Israel and here in the U.S.

Parents of pre-teens and teens, mark your calendars for two engaging opportunities to learn about the growing and ever-changing teen brain! Through a grant from "Scientists in Synagogues" Contra Costa Midrasha will host two events this year: December 20th and April 14th for community learning about teen brain development with the scientists who study it and the educators who teach our teens. Mark your calendars for these events all are welcome!

CCM's Tikkun Olam (Repair the World) programs have launched, with this exciting news to share:

- Better Together, our intergenerational teen-elder engagement project includes 24 teens and 17 elders from all over our community.
- Hamsa Fund, CCM's teen philanthropy Board held its retreat in October, crafting a mission to support formerly incarcerated youth to reintegrate into society.
- Impact Builder, a Better to Serve program aims to repair the world through direct service. Teens voted to work with Tiny Village Spirit in Richmond this year, helping build a community of tiny homes for homeless youth in Contra Costa County.


