Rabbi Dan's Reflection – My Last Beth Chaim Star Article



As I sat down to write my last article for the STAR, I looked back on my very first article written in October of 1993. It was titled, "Message from Dan Goldblatt -- Religious Leader." This title quickly jarred me into remembering that I wasn't yet an ordained rabbi when I first began serving Beth Chaim full-time. It

would be two more years until I was officially ordained in the summer of 1995 and I could claim the title, 'Rabbi.' 'Rabbi' has been a part of my identity for so many years, and it was moving to remember that I became ordained in order to be a more legitimate and better trained spiritual leader of this community.

Often, when I sit down to write my STAR contributions, I have very specific things I want to address. Whether it is an upcoming holiday, program or important issue, writing these pieces has been pretty straightforward. Then there are the times when I have sat at my keyboard and wondered, "What do I have to say to the community that some people might want to hear, or even need to hear, at this time?" Regardless of how many people actually read what I have written, I have always considered it a privilege to have this as one of a number of forums I have been gifted with to speak to the community. I have gratitude to those who have taken the time to read what I have written and was always especially grateful when someone took the time to mention that they had read one of my pieces and had something to say about it. Even if someone strongly disagreed with what I expressed, I was always pleased if someone took issue with my opinion and gave me the opportunity to discuss it further with them. I never sought agreement and have always been delighted by engagement.

So, in this, my last piece for the STAR as Rabbi of Beth Chaim, I want the community to know what a profound privilege it has been to serve this community over the past three decades. Throughout this final year of "lasts," I have been filled with gratitude for the relationships and connections with so many amazing people over the years. I deeply love to facilitate the sacred – it is the best part of my work. A rabbi can only do this if people are willing to fully enter into sacred moments, and I feel an enormous appreciation for all of you who have afforded me the trust to hold space for you in times of great joy and in times of sadness and grief. Thank you.

I also deeply believe in the synagogue culture we have created at Beth Chaim – a culture that is diverse, inclusive, deeply welcoming, warm and caring – and trust that every rabbi the community engages will appreciate this culture and seek to fully support it.

Finally, I want to be up front and say that I will not be present at the synagogue for the year during which the interim Rabbi Phil Cohen will be engaged, and I will likely not be present for at least the first year of the rabbi that will be hired next year. This is recommended by the Reform Movement and is a wise course of action. My presence would potentially undermine the authority of both the interim and the new rabbi, which I would never want to do. I will be Rabbi Emeritus and as such will be available behind the scenes to both the interim and the new rabbi as needed. My most sincere prayer is that Rabbi Cohen will ably serve the community and that Beth Chaim will flourish under the new rabbi when he or she is hired.

While we will not be physically present at synagogue functions or services, Zoë and I are not going anywhere. We plan to stay in Danville and will be engaged in directing the AriYael Jewish Healing Center along with our partners, Marc Mazer and Susan Talon Mazer. We will be offering programs here in the East Bay and on Zoom, and I trust that these programs will be well publicized to our community.

The bottom line is that while I will not be present at the synagogue for the foreseeable future, I will continue to be connected to the community that I love. I would be remiss not to close this piece without a special 'Thank You' to Deborah Wechsler, who has served for many years as Editor of the STAR and has done a remarkable job in this and so many other leadership roles in the community.

Nine Things You Did Not Know About Shavuot

Along with Passover and Sukkot, Shavuot is one of the three major Jewish pilgrimage festivals. It falls out precisely 49 days after the second day of Passover, a period of time known as the Omer, and marks the giving of the Torah to the Jewish people on Mount Sinai.

Here are 9 things you might not know about this springtime holiday.

Shavuot is the holiday of Jewish paper-cutting. Shavuot is a springtime festival, a period when the earth is coming into full bloom (in the northern hemisphere anyway). One Jewish legend recounts that Mount Sinai burst into flower with the giving of the Torah. In ancient times, Shavuot was also the time of *bikkurim*, when Jewish farmers would bring the first fruits of their crops as an offering to God in the temple. For these reasons, many synagogues have the custom of decorating their sanctuaries with flowers and greenery. But some rabbis were uncomfortable with this, fearing that it too closely resembled Christian traditions, which in turn led to the custom of using a papercut instead called a *shavuosl*.

Shavuot is Judaism's only all-nighter. The main ritual associated with Shavuot is known as <u>Tikkun Leil Shavuot</u>. The custom originated among the mystics of Safed as compensation for, according to the Midrash, the ancient Israelites slept in on the day of the giving of the Torah. To make up for that ancient mistake and to show our eagerness to receive the Torah, the custom emerged of staying up all night to study.

Ladino speakers recite a marriage contract on Shavuot. The relationship between God and the Jewish people is often likened to marriage. The Talmud calls Shavuot the wedding day between God and the Jewish people. To mark this anniversary, many Sephardic communities developed liturgy describing the holiday as a symbolic

betrothal of the Jewish people to God. Ladino-speaking Jews went even further, reciting a liturgical poem called Le Ketubah de la Ley, the marriage contract of the law.

The figure most associated with the holiday wasn't born Jewish. Traditionally the biblical Book of Ruth is read in synagogue on Shavuot. The book tells the story of Ruth, a Moabite woman who returns to Israel with her mother-inlaw after the death of her husband. Ruth speaks the lines for which she would become known: "For wherever you go, I will go; wherever you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God my God." Ruth's embrace of Judaism took place around the time of Shavuot and her acceptance of the Jewish faith is seen as analogous to the Jewish acceptance of God's Torah.

Shavuot is the only holiday when dairy foods are encouraged. Eating meat and fish are signs of celebration in Jewish tradition, which is why many people eat beef or chicken on Shabbat and other Jewish holidays. Shavuot is the one Jewish observance where dairy foods like cheesecake and blintzes are customary. Various reasons for this tradition have been offered, but many link it to the fact that the kosher laws were handed down on Shavuot, and the ancient Israelites, finding that their meat was no longer kosher, ate dairy foods instead.

Shavuot is the only holiday with no fixed date. According to the Bible, Shavuot is observed seven weeks after "the sickle is first put to the standing grain." In practice, the counting began on the second day of Passover. Today it is observed on the 6th day of Sivan.

The Reform movement holds confirmation ceremonies on Shavuot. Confirmation is a late arrival to Jewish tradition, introduced by the Reform movement about 200 years ago as a way for a Jewish teenager to "confirm" their adult commitment to Judaism. The connection to Shavuot, which marks the acceptance of the Torah on Mount Sinai, is a natural one, though some Reform communities today observe the rite on Shabbat instead.

Shavuot is the least-observed major Jewish holiday. Various reasons have been suggested for this. Perhaps the most compelling is that, unlike Passover (with its seder and dietary restrictions), Sukkot (with its custom of eating in a sukkah for seven days), or Rosh Hashanah (with its shofar blowing and traditions of introspection and forgiveness), Shavuot is comparatively lacking in any specific dramatic rituals.

Israelis have water fights on Shavuot. In Israel (in a typical year) Shavuot is the holiday of water. Massive crowds engage in water fights on the holiday, tossing water balloons at each other or spraying passersby with powerful water guns. Others embrace the water idea by taking hikes along rivers and streams. The origins of this tradition aren't entirely clear, but some link it to North African Jewish communities that celebrated water on Shavuot because the Torah is sometimes compared to the life-giving properties of water. Also, it's the start of the hot season, so frolicking outside with water only makes sense.

The Hamsa Fund

The Hamsa Fund is the Jewish Teen Philanthropy Board of the East Bay. In the Hamsa Fund, teens are encouraged to give back to their community while developing essential leadership skills that serve them well into adulthood. Over the course of the school year, teens in the Hamsa Fund learn about fundraising, group decision-making, and the role of philanthropy, or doing *mitzvahs*, in Judaism.

At the beginning of the year, we start by picking the population or cause we want to support. As our group holds many people with many different opinions, we have to come together to agree on one goal through the process of consensus. Once we have chosen a specific cause, written a meaningful mission statement, and selected multiple non-profit organizations to apply for grants, we begin our fundraising journey by contacting our friends and family.

During this year's Hamsa Fund retreat, we were unable to choose between supporting the formerly incarcerated population or teens with mental health issues. Through the process of consensus, we combined the two ideas and arrived at the decision to support at-risk youth in the Bay Area. On the retreat, we also put together our mission statement:

This year the Hamsa Fund's mission is to support at-risk youth in the Bay Area through the funding of non-profit organizations that work towards securing housing & job opportunities, and towards providing access to education & mental health resources.



In light of the ongoing rise of Antisemitic attacks in the United States, the Hamsa Fund will focus additionally on fighting & advocating against Antisemitism by supporting the Bay Area Jewish Community Relations Council.

We are still fundraising until mid-May and we would greatly appreciate any donations from those in the Beth Chaim community. Donations can be made <u>here</u>. We are also actively recruiting teens for next year's program. You can nominate others <u>here</u>.

Yahrzeit Observance at Beth Chaim

We are pleased to introduce a new tradition at Beth Chaim Congregation. Many people say the Mourner's Kaddish at our Friday Erev Shabbat services. Some visit their loved one at the cemetery and place a small stone on the headstone. Unfortunately, many of us do not have the ability, or opportunity, to visit a loved one in the cemetery.

At Beth Chaim, we now have a beautiful granite stone where you may place a small stone in remembrance of your loved one. If you would like, please feel free to visit the Sanctuary, and place your own stone on the granite. There are stones already there for your convenience.

The granite tile is located in the front of the Sanctuary on a beautiful pedestal table designed and created by Jeff Reitzes. His design matches our current podium, Torah table, and side tables designed by former member Mel Weiss (z"l).

At the end of the week, your stone will be placed aside. We will then take all of the stones, placed during the year, and place them in the Ark during the High Holy Days Yizkor service.
