

Rabbi Phil's Thoughts

It's an odd way to work as a rabbi, this interim life. Travelling from town to town, from region to region for a year at a time, perhaps two. First, obviously, you have to find a synagogue interested in your services. Once coming to an agreement, you must find a place to live, learn a new zip code, find new doctors, find a new gym. You have to find a new Chinese restaurant, hopefully a good Thai one, too. You have to learn a whole new bunch of people's names. Above all, the interim rabbi has to learn, chick-chock, as much about the ways of his new congregation as quickly as possible.

It's definitely an odd way to be a rabbi.

But the rewards, I've found over the six years I've engaged in this work, are immense.

I'll begin with the externals, the new places. Through this work I've tasted Chicago, Indianapolis, St. Louis, LA. And now San Francisco lies at my feet. I've experienced, obviously, the towns in which my congregations are located, as well, West Lafayette, IN, Columbia, MO, Riverside, CA. There's a book in all of this moving about, which someday I intend to write.

My wife, Betsy Gamburg, joined me last year in this nationwide trek, having retired from her position as director of Jewish Family Services in Greensboro, NC in March 2023. In my last position, in Riverside, CA, she became an active member of the synagogue community in several different capacities.

The real reward of this work lies in the congregations themselves. As I've said in interviews, I fly in like Mary Poppins, help everyone see their lives somewhat differently, sing a few new songs, and at the end of the year, I fly out. At the end of this year, we'll likely fly to Greensboro, NC, our permanent home, where I'll settle down to write novels and scholarship.

What I especially love about interim work lies in its invitation to experience diversity. Each synagogue, mindfully or not, possesses its own unique culture, its own special annual events, its own rituals that flow



naturally from the Jewish calendar and the unique nature of each shul. Each synagogue I've served in this capacity has its own entrée into the holy, those moments over the year that celebrate and experience the relationship between God and the Jewish people, between God and all men and women, between God and the world. Each synagogue worships the same God, but somewhat differently as bespeaks the nature of the individual place.

But I have to say that the single most wonderful gift this life has offered me, and now Betsy, are the many friends we have made along the way. As an interim rabbi I have met so many interesting and loving people that I can say without equivocation our lives would be different and poorer without our many new friends. It's fair to hope that my journey has helped and perhaps in small ways changed the congregations I have served for the better. I can say with certainty that my life would be quite different, and much diminished, had I not trod this path.

And beginning July 1, a few days ago, Betsy and I have become members of BCC with the opportunity to experience the spiritual life of Beth Chaim Congregation, to see firsthand what makes this house of worship so special, to meet the folks who make BCC their spiritual home. We are looking forward to becoming a part of this house of worship and making friends with its members.

Tisha B'Av

Tisha B'Av, the ninth of the month of Av, is a day of mourning for Jews. It is the day Jews remember the destruction of both Temples that once stood in Jerusalem as well as a number of other tragedies that have befallen the Jewish people over the course of history.

A three-week mourning period preceding Tisha B'Av begins on the 17th day of the month of Tammuz. According to the Mishnah, this was the day the Romans succeeded in breaching the walls of Jerusalem in 70 C.E.; the Mishnah also mentions other tragic events that occurred on this day in Tammuz. Traditional Jews do not get married or celebrate other joyous festivities in these three weeks.

Nine days prior to Tisha B'Av, a new period of more intense mourning begins. Traditional Jews do not eat meat, cut their hair, or wash their clothes unless they are to be worn again during the nine days. All these actions are considered signs of joy or luxury inappropriate for this time of mourning. Reform, Reconstructionist, and Conservative Jews adopt a varied range of these practices.

The Shabbat immediately preceding the festival is *Shabbat Hazon* (vision). The name derives from the *haftarah* (prophetic reading) for the day. Taken from Isaiah 1, the reading describes Isaiah's vision of national disaster befalling the Israelites because of their sins.

Tisha B'Av is a full fast day, so the last meal must be eaten before sunset prior to the ninth of Av. In addition to abstaining from food or drink during Tisha B'Av, Jewish tradition also mandates refraining from wearing leather, engaging in sexual relations, washing one's body, and using perfume or other such ointments. Visiting cemeteries on this day is encouraged, as if to heighten the sadness.

Uniquely on Tisha B'Av, Torah study, meant to be joyful, is not permitted. Some parts of the Bible or Talmud are allowed, like Job or Jeremiah, or sections of the Talmud or Midrash that discuss the destruction of Jerusalem. In the synagogue, the lights are dimmed and the ornamental *parokhet* (covering) is removed from the ark as a sign of mourning before the evening service. Congregants remove their leather shoes and do not greet each other.

Megillat Eicha (the Scroll of Lamentations)—which is a lament for the destruction of the First Temple — is chanted during the Maariv service, along with several kinot, elegies or dirges written at different periods of Jewish history. The kinot speak of the suffering and pain of Jewish tragedy through the ages. An extended set of kinot are traditionally recited during the morning service, and some communities repeat the chanting of Eicha in the morning as well. The traditional Torah reading is Deuteronomy 4:25-40 and the haftarah is Jeremiah 8:13-9:23, which is chanted to the same tune as Lamentations the night before.

The meal ending the fast traditionally omits meat and wine, in acknowledgment of the fact that the burning of the Temple continued until the next day. Finally, the sorrow that began on the 17th of Tammuz comes to a halt and the Shabbat immediately following Tishah B'Av is called *Shabbat Nahamu* (Shabbat of comfort) because the Haftarah begins with the words "nahamu nahamu ami" ("comfort, comfort my people"). This begins a period of consolation and comfort leading up to Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year.

Tu B'Av – the "Jewish Valentine's Day"

Tu B'Av, the 15th Day of Av, is both an ancient and modern holiday. Originally a post-biblical day of joy, it served as a matchmaking day for unmarried women in the Second Temple period (before the fall of Jerusalem in 70 C.E.). Tu B'Av was almost unnoticed in the Jewish calendar for many centuries but it has been rejuvenated in recent decades, especially in the modern state of Israel. In its modern incarnation it is gradually becoming a Hebrew-Jewish Day of Love, slightly resembling Valentine's Day in English-speaking countries.

There is no way to know exactly how early Tu B'Av began. The first mention of this date is in the Mishnah (compiled and edited in the end of the second century. The Gemara (the later, interpretive layer of the Talmud) attempts to find the origin of this date as a special joyous day and offers several explanations. One of them is that on this day the Biblical "tribes of Israel were permitted to mingle with each other," namely: to marry women from other tribes.

It should be noted that Tu B'Av begins on the night between the 14th and 15th day of the Hebrew month, since this is the night of a full moon in our lunar calendar. Linking the night of a full moon with romance, love, and fertility is not uncommon in ancient cultures.

In recent decades Israeli civil culture promotes festivals of singing and dancing on the night of Tu B'Av. The entertainment and beauty industries work overtime on this date. It has no formal legal status as a holiday - it is a regular workday - nor has the Israeli rabbinate initiated any addition to the liturgy or called for the introduction of any ancient religious practices. The cultural gap between Israeli secular society and the Orthodox rabbinate makes it unlikely that these two will find a common denominator in the celebration of this ancient/modern holiday in the foreseeable future.

Beth Chaim: Tell us about your careers:

Beth Chaim: How did you choose Beth Chaim?

Anna: Since we are an Interfaith family, I googled
Interfaith Synagogues, and Beth Chaim came up. We live
in San Ramon, so Beth Chaim is very close. At Easter, we
went to church for Easter Sunday. Gracie had all sorts of
questions about Passover and Judaism, but I had not
been connected to a synagogue since middle school. I
didn't want to confuse her, so I ordered some books from
Amazon about Passover. Then I sent an email inquiry to
find out more about Beth Chaim. We set up a Preview
Day for Gracie in Lara Groch's first grade Sunday School
class. Gracie enjoyed it so much that she continued in
the class until the last day of Sunday School in May!
Hector and I both came to the parent breakfast and
presentation on the last day of Sunday School.

Beth Chaim: What are you looking forward to at Beth Chaim?

Anna: I haven't been part of a synagogue in a very long time. We are all new to this. We joined for the religious school, and for Gracie to be aware and knowledgeable about her Judaism. Hector and I are open to attending and learning more, too, if it works with our schedules. Since I work night shifts full time, scheduling is often difficult for me. We have attended a couple of the PJ Library coffees at Tal's for young families. I also attended a mom's night out organized by Lara Groch. 

Contra Costa Midrasha's 2024 Summer/Fall Update

We are SO excited to start 2024-25 at Contra Costa Midrasha. Before we dive into our new year, I want to share some of the biggest accomplishments of this past year, 2023-24.

- Our overall student enrollment was up by 20% with a class of 23 teens graduating this May.
- CCM's retreats program now called "Bay Yachad" included over 9 teen-serving organizations from all over the Bay Area with 116 teens attending at least one retreat. (Though 60% attended two or more.)
- ➤ The Hamsa Fund teens raised \$4000 which they donated to the Jewish Community Relations Council, Youth Homes and CASA.
- ➤ Impact Builder dedicated their whole year to working with Tiny Village Spirit and hope to help them move into their facility early next year.
- ➤ Better Together's intergenerational programming bonded 19 elders and 25 teens, ending their year with a pickle making party!

Numbers don't tell the whole story. Here are my favorite quotes from some of our graduating teens telling why Midrasha was so meaningful and memorable for them:

- "Midrasha is not just a weekly event for me: it's my home, my haven, where I truly feel alive and a place where I've formed deep connections with amazing friends." - Noah
- "During my time at Midrasha, I discovered a vibrant Jewish community for teens just like me. Every Wednesday night, I looked forward to a place where I knew I would be accepted and loved for who I am. I learned what it means to be included, uplifted and unconditionally supported by a whole community. Midrasha also solidified my connection to Judaism. May we continue to learn and grow together, carrying the light of Midrasha wherever we go." -Avria


