Rabbi Phil's Thoughts - Choosing Life

I began writing this piece while in our sanctuary as our Chazanut group was having its first rehearsal in preparation for the High Holy Days. As in the past, we are in for a treat. Seven voices in harmony ushering in Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.



We intuitively grasp the weight of these days. We understand that they constitute the beginning and the end of our Jewish year blending in perfect harmony the past, present, and future. Their many themes and rituals blend into a whole that transports us out of the mundane and into the transcendent. That transcendence bears a particular meaning.

The ethos of the High Holidays begins with the demand that we understand our finitude, that we are mortal, imperfect beings who, as the result of being made of flesh and blood, inevitably stumble. We stumble a lot. Inevitably we err, hopefully not of grave proportions, but err nonetheless. We become mired in the ramifications of these errors and find ourselves lurking around moral corners trying to find wholeness, without success. This loss of our moral grounding occurs over the passage of the year, and so we arrive at the High Holy days deeply in need of the kind of purifying Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur provide.

And so as these days approach, we engage in talk of turning, of atonement, of rediscovering our spiritual center. We do this through rituals like sounding the shofar, intended to awaken our souls. We eat apples and honey hoping for a sweet year. We bake round challahs to remind ourselves of the circularity of the year. We gather at a body of water to symbolically cast our sins far away. We fast, to engage in a mild affliction of our body so as to experience need, our needs and the needs of others. And we pray. We pray to engage with the Eternal, and we pray to remind ourselves of the many themes Jewish prayer raises: God's oneness, God's love for us. We pray to remind ourselves of the fragility of our lives and the lives of those we love, and those who form our community. We pray during these days to remind ourselves of the reality of sins and of our ability to atone for them. We pray to seek the means to forgive those who have sinned against us. We pray to return our being to a state of wholeness which allows us to face the new year and the old world with equanimity. We pray in the hope that our community and world will be just a little better than the year that passed.

This, then, is the great circle of our year. We enter Rosh Hashanah bearing the baggage from the last year on our backs, aware of our frailty in so many ways, and leave Yom Kippur, at the conclusion of Neilah, centered, in touch with our souls, reconnected with God, humanity, and the world.

It's a remarkable tradition.

This year I have decided to focus all four of my sermons on the theme "Choose Life". I will explore some of the many ways we should choose life over death, how we should be active rebels, seeking to bring shining life into this world.

Also, this year we will be instituting the observance of Selichot. This introductory holy day occurs on the Saturday night preceding Rosh Hashanah. I will gather an interfaith panel to discuss a theme pertinent to the High Holy Days and then hold a brief service as a way to be prepared for the onset of Rosh Hashanah.

Betsy and I wish all of you, our new community, a healthy, happy, and above all, a sweet new year.

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Sukkot and Simchat Torah

Sukkot comes right after Yom Kippur and it couldn't come too soon. Instead of the somber tones of Yom Kippur, with its emphasis on atonement and fasting, Sukkot is like a day at the ballpark. It's celebrated outdoors in a booth that's been decorated by the kids in the religious school (and anyone else so inclined). You wave a three-pronged thing (called a lulav) along with something that looks like an underripe, aromatic lemon (called etrog). You welcome guests into a booth (called a sukkah), say a few prayers, and you eat. And all the while you celebrate the freedom of the Israelites during their wanderings in the desert. And you eat. You might choose to sleep in the booth. And you eat. For eight days you come close to nature and to that element of God that represents nature. It's a wonderful outdoor festival that forms a remarkable point of our year.



Simchat Torah is a wonderful touchpoint in our year. We end the Torah cycle and we begin it anew. We end with the death of Moses on Mt. Nebo, and we begin with the creation of the world. We sing and dance with the Torah and bless our young people. The Torah cycle continues, our reading of it never ends, nor does our understanding of its words. We re-experience the stories and wonder as to their meanings. And every year we turn it over and over and find new things, as one Ben Bag Bag says in the familiar rabbinic compilation Pirke Avot.

And so with the conclusion of Simchat Torah we come to the conclusion of the High Holy Days, or, as those of us in the know call them, the HHDs. We begin Rosh Hashanah with the acknowledgement of the circularity of things, and end with Simchat Torah, that in its way teaches the circularity of our spiritual lives through the beginning and the end of the Torah cycle. We leave Simchat Torah with the ongoing sense that our lives are shot through with meaning, meaning we bring to these days via the holy tools given us by our Tradition.



We are SO excited to start 2024-25 at Contra Costa Midrasha. Our Opening Night kicks off September 4th! We hope 2024-25 will be just as impactful with our continued Wednesday nights, Bay Yachad retreats and bevy of Sunday Tikkun Olam (repair the world) programming. Registration for 2024-25 is now open.
