WOMEN OF THE HEBREW BIBLE


December 4, 11, 18

Rabbi Phil's Thoughts - An Unexpected Rabbi

It was January 1974 when I found myself facing the Western Wall, the Kotel, the remnant of the ancient Temple in Jerusalem. I'd flown to Israel via England on a student flight that had stopped in four cities before landing in Lod Airport (now Ben Gurion).



Just an hour or so before I approached the Wall, I'd arranged with the manager of a youth hostel to stay for free in exchange for light duties. To be out and about in Jerusalem was a dream come true. It was cheap - lodgings and meals would be free. Buses, which went everywhere, cost a few pennies, and there was hummus and felafel.

This sort of moment lay beyond the ordinary. This moment brought a whiff of something tying everything together into a coherent whole. I was free to roam the city and enjoy the antiquity of it, a sense of an old world circulating within a new world. I was in Jerusalem, yet without a focus, save the fun walking around the streets of a very old city. This formed an undifferentiated sense of belonging, yes, because this was the Jewish country and that much I knew about myself, that I was a Jew.

So, there I stood, staring at the Wall, a black cardboard yarmulke balancing precariously on my head, wondering what I was supposed to be feeling. I didn't feel much, and I felt bad that I didn't feel much, because I assumed I was supposed to be feeling a lot. Even so, there I stood, staring at the Wall. As these things go, that ambiguous moment constituted the commencement of a journey that, let's be honest, remains ongoing even as I write these words. Putting it more clearly, though I surely didn't know it, my life stood on the precipice of taking a turn I wouldn't have imagined possible.

But at that moment, with enough curiosity to bring me to that ancient place, nonetheless I felt little tangible connection to it, not historical, religious, or emotional, save a vague intuition that it was supposed to be important.

I knew some things, precious few, but a few. Thanks to my eleventh-grade history teacher, Mr. Schleider, I knew a bit about the 1967 Six Day War, which among many victories included the recapture of Jerusalem's Old City, the ground upon which I stood being a critically important element of that victory. There's an iconic photo of the Israeli soldiers who were first to the Wall on the moment of its recapture. Even so, there was that intuition that brought me face to face with the Western Wall while that cardboard yarmulke still balanced precariously atop my unsuspecting head.

I came to the Wall with a college degree but with no vocational plans, no grad school, no law school, nothing. Even with four years of higher education behind me, and with them the general sorts of academic and personal experiences college provides, my identity remained only slightly less shadowy than it was the day I entered college. I'd had a lot to overcome and little cultural fabric to put on to protect me from a world I still knew precious little about, including the tradition to which I belonged as a birthright.

"What brings you to Israel?" a thin, bearded man asked. He wore a long black coat and black hat and spoke with an accent betraying his origins in New York. He introduced himself as Meyer Schuster. When I hesitated, he asked me again of my reason for coming to Israel. I gave a vague answer about hanging out in Jerusalem for a while then moving off to a kibbutz, where I had hopes of meeting an attractive Swedish volunteer to pick pears with at five in the morning and then to hang out at the kibbutz pool for the rest of the day. I didn't mention the Swedish volunteer to Schuster, only the kibbutz part.

"How would you like to go to school instead?" he asked.

"How much will it cost?" I asked, having but a few hundred dollars in travelers' checks to support me through my travels.

"It's free," he said.

The offer, with little further explanation, intrigued me. School, for free. It invoked images of late-night chats over beer, cigarettes, and pot, chats aimlessly but energetically parsing the meaning of every corner of the universe.

"It's a yeshiva," Meir Schuster continued.

I vaguely knew what a yeshiva was, an Orthodox fulltime day school. Since he wasn't inviting me to go back to high school, I surmised that yeshiva was a more generic term for an Orthodox school.

And so I went and so I remained for perhaps a month and a half, a significantly shorter period of time than the rebbes of the yeshiva would have preferred. But the time there worked on me, and though I left the yeshiva behind, it challenged me to explore my Jewish self, something that had never before occurred to me. And that challenge grew as I came to understand the greatness of the Jewish tradition. And even though the Jew I became was not to rest within the Orthodox tradition, I see my identity rooted in part at least in that yeshiva experience. In any event, those weeks propelled me into a world and helped build an identity that would otherwise have been unimaginable.

The road I travelled since a young man in his twenties staring at the Western wall continues on today and will do so. And I will tread on that highway until I can no longer do so.

Hanukkah

What about that tiny cruse of oil that miraculously lasted eight days when by rights it should have lasted but one?

Ok. When you think of it, how does this miracle compare to, say, the splitting of the Sea? It's a minor miracle. Moreover, let's recall the origin story of this miracle.

The Temple in Jerusalem, having been defiled by the pagan Syrian Greeks, had been recaptured, cleansed, and was ready to be rededicated (which, by the way, is the meaning of Hanukkah). And when the Maccabees sent little Yonatan into the back room to bring out the pure olive oil needed for the ceremony, all he could find was that one tiny cruse of oil. Not wishing to delay the ceremony, the leaders took their chances, lit the oil, and, lo and behold! The oil lasted eight days!

But here's the problem. Other than losing the cost of the catering, what harm would have been done had the leaders simply postponed the ceremony for eight days until a new batch of pure olive oil could have been acquired?

All right, so if the rationalist in me wants to play with one of our sacred stories, so what?

I think if you look behind the Hanukkah story, another, more powerful idea rises to full view; ideas, actually.

The first idea resides in the historical fact that the Maccabees, i.e., the Jews, won a battle against insurmountable odds. The war against a powerful oppressor who had imposed serious restrictions against the worship of God - that vile enemy was defeated. The few defeated the many, and their lives and religious freedom were restored to the way they had been.

Thus, the first ideas to emerge from the Hanukkah tale: that freedom is a fight worth fighting, and that it's quite possible for the few to defeat the many. Great ideas, and in my book anyway, ideas that surpass a jar of oil that lasted eight days. But that's just me.

The other idea, however, sees the lights that we light as a great symbol, one of the best, of the divine-human relationship. In the darkest time of the year, we fill with world with light. We're supposed to "pirsum et ha-nes," publicize the miracle. And we do so by filling our windows with hanukkiot shining out onto the street and into the world. On Hanukkah millions of hanukkiot shine throughout the planet and into the Milky Way. We shine a light and tell God that we're here, recognizing God's presence in our lives, and our presence in God's life, as well. The lights of Hanukkah form a divine symbiosis between us and the Master of the Universe.

To this I must add a somber note.

Freedom to worship and live as Jews is never to be taken for granted. There will always be someone wishing to take that freedom from us. Today is a time when those voices of oppression are particularly loud and virulent. And present throughout the world.

So this is a time when our voices must be loud and angry. And present throughout the world. We must be vigilant, because we will never know where and when that next voice is going to come from. But it will come. And when it does, we must be prepared to act. We must be prepared to follow the example of the Maccabees and fight against those who would create vile untruths about the nature of the Jews and our three millennia old religious civilization.

We will light lights, yes. The more the better. We will sing out to the heavens the greatness of our sacred story. But we will also be prepared to act as necessary whenever our name is libeled. We pray to God and take care of ourselves.

Thanksgiving

We Jews have found a home in America. It's been a good home for us in so many ways. The shocking upsurge of antisemitism in this last year has, of course, forced us to retrench more than a bit, make us vigilant, and question as to the extent of our home here. But even with the dangers posed by the many antisemitic actors we face, we Jews have without doubt made a home for ourselves in these United States, one virtually unparallelled in the long history of our wanderings about the world.

There are great symbols of our lives as Americans, celebrations across the length of the year that we partake in enthusiastically. But none is more meaningful than Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving is America's great religious festival of unity and affirmation.

I know that in recent years we've looked carefully at Thanksgiving's origins and learned that the famous banquet held in Plymouth, Massachusetts between the Pilgrims and the Native Americans may not have been as ideal as we were taught in elementary school. But the ambiguity of origins notwithstanding, the story of people gathering in celebration of a growing unity, sharing a sense of common purpose in spite of our many personal origins (we being a nation of immigrants), holds great meaning.

For me and my immediate family, Thanksgiving has become the one non-negotiable gathering of the year. Our geographic locations, coupled with my schedule during the year do not allow a family gathering to regularly take place on Rosh Hashana or Pesach. But for the Cohen-Roytmans, Thanksgiving is sacrosanct.

The relation of the original Thanksgiving to the Old Testament is something that may not be well known. When the Pilgrims conceived the celebratory feast they looked into their Bible and found Sukkot. Sukkot has long been, loosely speaking, the model for our Fourth-Thursday-of-every-November commemoration. Too, in recent generations, many communities will have an interfaith Thanksgiving service, as do we in our neck of the woods. I'm looking forward to participating in that service.

What amazes me about American Thanksgiving is that sense of communal unity it commands. One day a year we gather and feast. We count our blessings and express our gratitude for what we've received. As best we can (this being an extraordinarily divided time in America) we set aside our differences and celebrate what we have in common. And what we have in common is: A vast and beautiful land, a democratic government that gives voice to many voices, enough wealth to address issues of homelessness and poverty, and a great culture that enriches so many aspects of our lives, that draws into its purview the innumerable cultures that reflect our many origins.

And we Jews sit at the same table as everyone else, thanking our God and all the peoples that form our nation's whole.

In my house we prepare for Thanksgiving by preparing a menu of uncountable dishes, each of us taking a role in the prep. Then we sit and eat, and then fifteen minutes later we're away from the table and doing whatever comes next. Since Betsy among everyone else is a true football fan, we may, out of love and respect for her put on a game.

The whole gestalt of the moment is that wonderful feeling that this day is packed with meaning, that family is crucially important, that love draws us together as a nation this year as last, and will do so again next year.

So, my new friends, Happy Thanksgiving. May your day be solemn yet bright, may your turkey not be dry, may your team win. But above all, may you and your family find that unquenchable moment of love that makes all things worthwhile.


Help Manage Our Waste - Tikkun Olam Starts at Home!
