



January 29, February 5, 12



Rabbi Phil's Thoughts

Both January and
February, the two months
that occupy this issue of
The Star, contain
elements relevant to the
African American
community. In January we
celebrate Martin Luther
King's legacy, this year on
January 20th. All of
February has been



designated African American History month, an opportunity to learn about the Africa American contribution to this country. (As a quick aside, May has been designated as Jewish American Heritage Month - JAHM.) Interfaith-San Ramon Valley is organizing a day of service in honor of MLK Day. Stay tuned for more information as it becomes available.

I thought I'd use this confluence as an opportunity to introduce you to one of my rabbinic heroes, Rabbi Joachim Prinz. Rabbi Prinz (1902-1988) was born in Germany. Ordained at the Jewish Theological Seminary in Breslau, he served as a rabbi in Berlin. As Hitler rose to power, he became a powerful vocal critic of the Nazi regime, so much so that he was threatened with incarceration if he did not leave the country. He did leave and came to the US where he served Temple B'nai Abraham in Newark, NJ. He also became a national figure, touring the country on behalf of Israel, and served as president of the American Jewish Congress (AJC) from 1958-1966. He traveled the country in support of civil rights, joining picket lines in protest of racial prejudice and all the inequality racism generates.

The AJC was a co-sponsor of the famous March on Washington on August 28, 1963. Rabbi Prinz was invited to speak, which he did, right after the singer Odetta, and right before Dr. King, who delivered his masterful I Have a Dream speech.

Rabbi Prinz's speech is excellent, though quite justifiably eclipsed by MLK's remarks. Prinz's words emerge from his experience with fascism in Germany and racism in America.

Here are some of Rabbi Prinz's remarks given on that historic day in August 1963:

"In the realm of the spirit, our fathers taught us thousands of years ago that when God created man, he created him as everybody's neighbor. Neighbor is not a geographic term. It is a moral concept. It means our collective responsibility for the preservation of man's dignity and integrity.

From our Jewish historic experience of three and a half thousand years we say:

Our ancient history began with slavery and the yearning for freedom. During the Middle Ages my people lived for a thousand years in the ghettos of Europe. Our modern history begins with a proclamation of emancipation.

It is for these reasons that it is not merely sympathy and compassion for the black people of America that motivates us. It is above all and beyond all such sympathies and emotions, a sense of complete identification and solidarity born of our own painful historic experience... the most important thing that I learned under those tragic circumstances (his experience under Naziism) was that bigotry and hatred are not the most urgent problem. The most urgent, the most disgraceful, the most shameful and the most tragic problem is silence."

Surely the problem of "silence" remains with us today. We live in a world besieged with issues that demand our attention. In such a climate the impulse to silence should be shunned. We need to constantly voice our opposition to acts of oppression, prejudice, and antisemitism. We much lift our voices and shout to heaven our passion for justice in a world where justice is frequently absent.

People like Dr. King and Rabbi Prinz offer us models for thought and action, a path to navigate our way through a world desperately in need of our help.


Marc Feder, Vice President

This month's article is about our newest member, Jo-Ann Paul, who used to be a member of Beth Chaim in the 1990's and has remained good friends with Lois Kamoroff all these years.

Beth Chaim: Tell us about your family. **Jo-Ann:** We have two children. Our olde

Jo-Ann: We have two children. Our oldest, Andrew, lives in Las Vegas with his wife Robbyn and their son. Our daughter Pam and her husband Charlie Grossman live in Minnesota with their two children. My husband Mike passed away in March 2021.

Beth Chaim: Where did you grow up?

Jo-Ann: My husband and I were both born in Brooklyn, but our families moved to Bayside (Queens), NY, when I was five and Mike was seven. We lived in a very close-knit Jewish community. We all knew each other, and all went to everyone's family occasions. Mike and I both had all the same teachers in elementary school, and we both graduated from Bayside High School. We shared the same values and beliefs, but we did not start dating until Mike was in graduate school and I was in college.

I attended the State University of NY (SUNY) in Cortland. I received my master's degree at NYU in 1968 in what was called recreation for the ill and disabled. My specialty was setting up rehab programs for people with cerebral palsy. Mike went to Parsons College in Iowa for undergrad and got his MBA at Syracuse University. He became a bond salesman and worked in the stock market.

Beth Chaim: Tell us about your Jewish upbringing and education, etc.

Jo-Ann: I did not have a religious upbringing. Our family did not belong to the local temple or have any Jewish education. For Jewish holidays, we had all the traditional foods, like brisket, but it was never a religious event. My husband's family belonged to the local temple, Beth Shalom, in Flushing, NY. He had his Bar Mitzvah and brought more religious traditions to the holidays when we were married.

Mike was an officer who served in the navy in Viet Nam. Later he was stationed at Pearl Harbor. His commitment was 3 years, and he thought he would see the world in the navy. We lived in Forest Hills in Queens, then moved to New Jersey when our son Andrew was $2\frac{1}{2}$ years old.

Beth Chaim: When did you move to Danville?

Jo-Ann: We moved to Danville in July 1983, to the same house I live in now. Mike opened an office in SF in investment banking for Chase Manhattan Bank. We knew two families who lived in Danville, so we chose to move here. I was surprised there were no school buses like we had back in NJ, and Mike worked in SF with NY stock exchange hours, so I could not go back to work. Our kids went to Charlotte Wood and Montair, and I needed to do all the driving, school volunteering, etc., which I enjoyed. Both of our kids graduated from San Ramon Valley High School.

Before we left NJ, Andrew had been studying for his Bar Mitzvah. We joined Temple Isaiah, but we chose to continue Andrew's Bar Mitzvah training on the phone with our temple in NJ. Andrew had his Bar Mitzvah in New Jersey, and we told everyone that our family traveled the farthest to attend his Bar Mitzvah. The rest of the family and friends were all living in NY and NJ.

Pam had her Bat Mitzvah at Temple Isaiah, and both children were confirmed there. Afterwards, we dropped our membership there. Since we were living in Danville, we went to High Holiday services at Beth Chaim, before the current building was built. We joined in the 1990's and were in a Chavurah with Lois and Sandy Shalon. Mike used to play on the Beth Chaim baseball team, and he played tennis with Rabbi Dan at Crow Canyon.

Beth Chaim: What hobbies, sports or activities do you like to do?

Jo-Ann: I have worked part time in the travel industry for 34 years, so I like to travel a lot. I specialize in upscale cruises and tours. In March I will be going to Viet Nam and Thailand. I also travel to see my children's families, and other family and friends. I play golf at Crow Canyon, and Mah Jongg once a week at my house. When I am not playing golf, I like to work out.



Beth Chaim: What are you looking forward to most at Beth Chaim?

Jo-Ann: I have always done a lot of volunteer work. I am interested in volunteering at Reutlinger again. Years ago, Mike and I used to lead a monthly Bingo program there once a month. Mike also taught guitar at the Vet Center in Concord for many years, which really changed the lives of many Vets, especially those who had PTSD, because it was so calming for them. The program is still going on. Mike found out through the VA Hospital that he had been exposed to Agent Orange, when he was on the Saigon River in 1967. Sadly, that is what contributed to his death in 2021.


Help Manage Our Waste - Tikkun Olam Starts at Home!

- 3. Try to stack your used plates and cups BEFORE throwing them in the trash. Stacked items occupy less space and we will save on waste overage costs.


